EXCELLENT ADDRESS AT ROTARY LUNCHEON YESTERDAY

Mr. Clare Cameron Chief Speaker Of The Day Relates Many Interesting And Thrilling Accounts Of Great Battle.

Yesterday was Vimy Day at the Rotary Club and the chief speaker was one of the survivors of the historic battle—Mr. Clare Cameron, who gave an eloquent address which appears below.

Rotarian H. H. Search presided at the luncheon and the guests were: L. Dyal of New York; Gilbert Houston, Gordon Shaw, G. Elmer Ritchie, Manning E. Bagnall, Percy Mutch and Russel Chandler. The president, Dr. MacMillan, referred to the appointment of ex-District Governor Hon. George S. Inman, as Judge of the County Court for Prince County. He extended hearty congratulations to Judge Inman, on receiving such great distinction. His appointment he believed would meet with the hearty approval, not only of Rotarians, but of the people of the province generally. "Since a Liberal had to get it," said the speaker, there could have been no better choice than our fellow Rotarian George S. Inman.

This appointment will necessitate a change in his position in the club, but he was pleased to announce that Judge Inman had been unanimously elected as honorary member. Judge Inman, in a few appropriate words thanked the President for his kind personal references, and also thanked the club for electing him an honorary member.

Let us, through that dominant power, imagination, harken back to the early summer of 1914. We stand upon the crest of Vimy Ridge and see a people leisurely strolling to a place where they stand—attracted by its beauty—a ridge rich in verdant splendour. Even rumor of war has not seriously penetrated its beauty. We are held by its restfulness. We gaze here and there, expectantly, hurriedly, and in no apparent order. Lens in the distance, Abilene St. Nazaire, seems almost hidden in the

AFGHAN VISITORS INTEREST LONDON

King Amanullah Has Strong Personality And But One Wife—Advance In Nine Years' Reign.

LONDON, April 9. — King Amanullah and Queen Souliya of Afghanistan who stayed at Buckingham Palace the first three days of their visit in London as the guests of King George and Queen Mary, have been staying at one of London's leading hotels since the guests of the nation, along with their suite of 50 persons, are occupying a whole floor in the hotel that for the time being has the atmosphere and dignity of a royal palace. The Royal visitors live in an interior of green, silver and mauve, relieved by soft lights and elegant Afghan and Persian rugs. Mauve is the favorite color of Queen Souliya.

Extending the whole length of the third floor, the apartments include two private dining-rooms, one for the King, and the other for the Queen, and 12 superbly appointed drawing and reception rooms and a cozy boudoir for Queen Souliya, besides retiring rooms for the women of her entourage. Fifty bedrooms accommodate the suite, among whom are the King's sister and her husband, Queen Souliya's father, who is the Afghan Foreign Minister; the Queen's sister, Mrs. Bibi Khanum, the personal attendants and secretarial staffs of the King and Queen; the Afghan Minister at Rome, and prominent dignitaries of the Afghan Court and Army.

The plans for ensuring the comfort of the King and Queen have been made with such precision that they are ministered to as if they were living in their own palace in Kabul. When the Royal couple leave or enter a room or the lift special bells give warning note to the attendants, so that there may not be a moment's delay. All the rooms are maintained at a summer heat temperature day and night. Artists in flower arrangement periodically supervise the display of choice blooms throughout the suite. Motor cars are always in readiness. Four Afghan cooks co-operate with the hotel cooking staff in making the daily menu a faithful reproduction of the meals eaten in the Royal Palace at Kabul.

King Amanullah rules over territory as extensive as the German Empire before the war, with a people more numerous than the Belgians, or the population of Australia, or Canada. But Afghanistan, sandwiched between the vast expanses of Asiatic Russia and India, meant, three months ago, no more to the average Englishman than the vague memories of mountain passes and savage tribesmen, and Kabul and Kandahar, of Lord Roberts' victories and of earlier disasters. That the sudden emergence of Afghanistan is due to the King and Queen is clear, but the King himself will puzzle the world for a long time to come. He is 35, with a face and figure that expresses vigour of mind and body. But until he came into India by the Khyber at the end of last year he had never been out of Afghanistan, never seen a railway train, a ship or the sea. Yet in his nine years' reign he has shown himself the possessor of a broad mind, a clear vision, and grasp of realities that have guided

his reforming zeal, and saved him from many blunders. King Amanullah owes much no doubt to Tari Khan, the Queen's father, and Minister of Foreign Affairs, who lived abroad for 20 years—much also, perhaps, to Mustapha Kemal, head of the most powerful Moslem State in the world, whom reforms are known in Kabul and who, like Amanullah, has abandoned polygamy for one wife.
