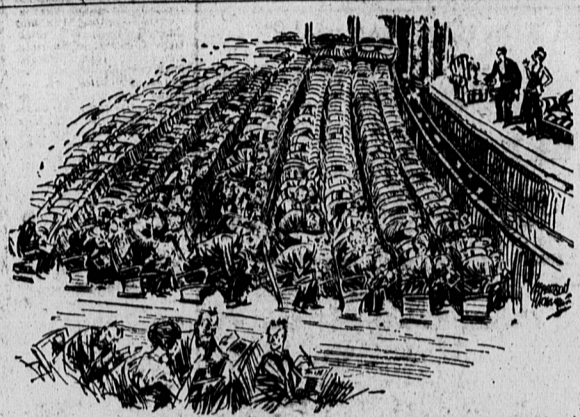

Worried Wife (over telephone to husband): "Sam, please come right home—I've got some connection wrong in the house, and the radio set is all covered with ice, while the electric refrigerator is singing 'Red Hot Mama'!"

10 A. S. had two Church services on the air on Sunday, the Methodist in the morning, and the Central Christian in the evening. Both services were excellently transmitted, as was also the sacred recital, after the evening service from the Central Christian Church.

The following clipped from a recent copy of a New Glasgow, N.S. paper, shows that 10 A. S. is "getting out":
"Yesterday morning some local radio experts heard Rev. Dr. Clarence MacKinnon on the radio. Dr. MacKinnon was preaching in Charlottetown and the sermon, which was a most interesting one, was broadcast. The reports state that the address came through quite clearly."

Now that short wave broadcasting has become a reality, and a world-wide system of inter-communication a probability, the question of an international language is again very much to the fore. Will it be Esperanto, Volapuk or Ido? The opinion holds in some well-informed quarters, however, that in all probability some living language will be adopted, and the chances are that English will eventually become that universal language.

General Harbocco, President of the Radio Corporation of America, makes the following interesting radio forecasts:
1. Photographs by radio over long distances as, for example, between New York and London.

2. Telegraphing a complete newspaper page across the oceans in but a fraction of the time required by present telegraphic methods.
3. Being able to carry on a two-way telephone conversation between a passenger on board a ship in mid-ocean any point on land where an ordinary telephone is available.
4. America listening in to a concert, or to a speech, or to any other important event taking place in England, France or Germany—in short, the realization of international broadcasting.

When John McCormack and Loretta Borri sang over the radio to an audience of 6000,000 people recently, the applause cards, letters and telegrams, received at station W.E.A.F. totalled 65000! A score of clerks were required to handle the mail, every piece of which was answered.

We would like to retract our guess as to the identity of the tenor who sang The Old Refrain and Annie Laurie, in last week's Brunswick hour recital. When announcing Annie Laurie, Mr. White said that the singer was no less famous than the song. Did any of our readers recognize the voice?

The question is often asked, that as radio improves, would it not be wise to put off the purchase of a set until such time as receivers reach a greater state of perfection? The answer is that radio sets have not changed in principle to any marked degree in several years. Good results may be expected from any high grade set. Automobiles have been on the market now since 1900, and we have yet to see the perfect automobile. However this does not prevent millions from employing cars of all makes. Does not the same hold good in regard to radio? You may wait for the ultimate receiver, but in the meantime you will be missing a lot of fun.

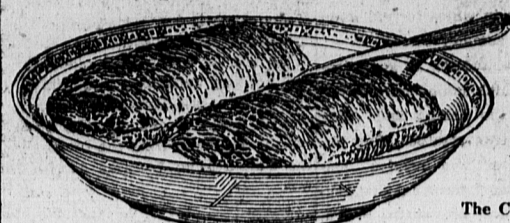
