Millionaires All But Eliminate Hull From Allan Cup Playdowns

SYDNEY, N. S., March 24—(CP)—Sydney Millionaires broke Hull Volants to the brink of elimination from the Allan Cup playdowns tonight as they faced the Ottawa and District champions 5-1 to take a 2-0 game lead in their best-of-five Eastern semi-final.

The Maritime champions took the first game of the round 3-1 late Saturday night. The teams now move to Ottawa for the remainder of the series that will send a contender into the Eastern final.

Slow getting started, Millionaires picked up the only goal of the first period to Hull. But they overtook the visitors swiftly in the next session with a pair of tallies and slipped in three more in the last period to make victory sure.

Volants, abandoning a defensive game that proved unproductive

played wide open hockey for the greater part of the second game, but Sydney bettered their performance as Millionaires' superior experience and play told.

Hull Scores First

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Willkie Holds Spotlight As Bruins Arrive To Resume Series With Leafs

TORONTO, March 24—(CP)—Arrival of Boston Bruins—National Hockey League champions—almost went unnoted today as Toronto's thousands honored Wendell Willkie. But the lack of attention didn't worry the Bruins as they waited to renew their Stanley Cup semi-final round with Toronto Maple Leafs here tomorrow night.

"It was fine to see Canada give Mr. Willkie such a welcome," said Art Ross, Bruins manager. "We like him a lot in Boston and it's too bad he can't stay over and see the game." The fixture that the former United States Republican presidential candidate will miss is the third of a best-of-seven game series. Each team has won once.

There was confidence in both camps as hopes were held out for injured players to return to the fray. Spi Aapps, ace playmaker and captain of the Leafs, skated with four team mates today. If club doctors approve he'll be in action tomorrow night. The big fellow has been on the sidelines for a month due to a knee injury.

All news from the Toronto camp

was not bright, and Coach Hap Day had to rest Bingo Kampman after he found the bulky defenseman's ankle was bothering him in skating drill. Bingo suffered torn ankle ligaments near the close of the regular season and did not play in the first two series games in Boston.

Hank Goldup, rangy right winger who was used in the opening playoff encounters, also skated in an effort to regain needed condition. Goldup has not shown his usual brilliant form since fracturing his hip early in the campaign. Defenseman Jack Church and winger Lex Chisholm also skated for conditioning.

If Aapps returns to the lineup, chances of the Leafs will soar and the Toronto team will probably be established as favorites in the betting ring.

Ross would not say whether his injured forward from line stars, Bill Cowley and Bobby Bauer, would don harness. Both players were missed as the Leafs won 5-3 in Boston Saturday night to even the round.

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Ottawa Canadiens Arrive Here For Series Against Surprising Junior Royals

Fresh from winning the Ottawa and District junior hockey championship Ottawa Canadiens arrived in the city last night primed for their day with Walter Lawlor's Junior Royals. The series, the best two out of three affair, marks the third straight year that a Charlottetown club has been in the Memorial Cup playdowns.

Surprising winners over Junior Truro Bears last year's edition of the Royals enter the series the underdogs. But their fighting spirit plus surprising showing in the Maritime playoffs gives the local youngsters an even chance to advance further. Light, but fast and rugged the Royals will present a squad that has proven equal to any which represented the city in the matter of plain, raw courage. That they will fight to the last is a foregone conclusion; they proved it in their series against Kensington and Truro and pitted against a team that is carrying the banner of a district champion that has already sent two Maritime champions down to defeat in the first round of Memorial Cup playdowns this year's Royals team can be expected and will give a performance that will be equal to any that has gone before.

Royals, little thought of until they beat Truro for the Maritime title can be expected to give all they have. Walter Lawlor the coach, has instilled the same fighting spirit that was his own into the ranks of the young team that represents the Maritimes this year. They may be light, they may be lacking in experience but the win to win, plus courageous hearts will still give the Ottawa and District champions the battle of their lives.

The Hawks, somewhat battered after a torrid game they dropped 4-3 after two overtime periods in Montreal, were confident the return to home ice would give them the little bit of extra advantage.

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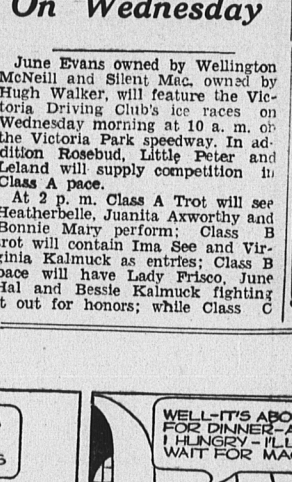

Rangers and Detroit tonight

Detroit, March 24—(CP)—New York Rangers aren't the least bit superstitious but nonetheless they must overcome a bugaboo if they are to advance in their fight to retain possession of the Stanley Cup.

Away from home and on enemy territory that has yielded but one Ranger victory in two seasons of National Hockey League play, the New Yorkers collide again tomorrow night with the hard-hitting Detroit Red Wings.

Each team as taken one game in the best-of-three series and the third will decide which will advance against either Montreal Canadiens or Chicago Black Hawks. The victor in that second series needs either Toronto or Boston for the Cup, emblem of world supremacy.

Jack Adams' Wings took the series opener in Detroit last Thursday by a 2-1 score in overtime. Rangers claimed they lost that one because for the first time this season they elected to play defensive hockey. They reversed that procedure in New York last night and skated off with a well-earned 3-1 victory.

"We never should have played a defensive game in Detroit last time and we won't again," Coach Frank Boucher said in New York as the Rangers trained for Detroit.

"Watch our stroke Tuesday."

Royals edge Marlboros 3-1

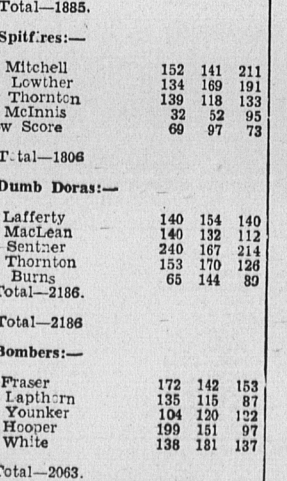
MONTREAL, March 24—(CP)—Montreal Royals out-fought Toronto Marlboros tonight to take a 3-1 victory and a one-game edge in the first game of their best-of-five semi-final hockey series.

Royals, Quebec champions for the third year in a row, were full value for their win. Marlboros fought an even terms for the first period, but then the effects of two games in as many days against South Porcupine Bears last weekend began to tell on them.

Jimmy Haggerty led the Royal attack, scoring the first goal of the series, and another in the second period that increased the Royals' edge to two goals, after Russ McConnell had offset Marlboros' only tally of the game from the stick of Eddie O'Brien.

A crowd of about 7,000 watched the game. The second of the series is scheduled for Toronto Wednesday night.

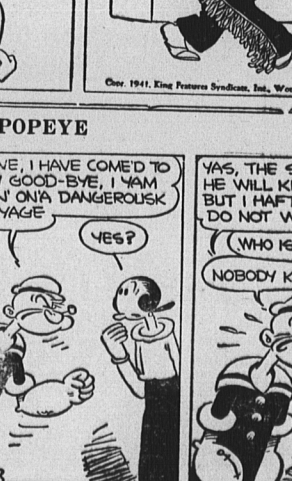
