Dr. James M. Farrar, who, as is well known throughout the country as the originator of the Junior Congregation, preached to his young folks on "The Wild Animals in Your Zoo." The text was from Proverbs xix:3, "His heart fretteth against the Lord." Dr. Farrar said:

Are you having any trouble with the animals in your Zoo? Some day I am coming to your Zoo to see the animals you have collected. Hope you will make the bars good and strong, as I am afraid of wild animals. Robert has a fine bear in his Zoo. No one has seen it, but a number of people have heard it growl. Roberta has a wolf in her Zoo. It snaps at and wants to bite those who come near the cage. Donald has a fine in his Zoo. Long before you see Donald you can hear his lion roar. You do not have a Zoo? Your body is the Zoo and somewhere in the heart are the animals that growl and snap and roar.

There is a wild animal that is very dangerous and feeds on happiness. Its name is Fret. There is the big Fret, the little Fret and the other Fret. You will find Fret very hungry in the morning and he often eats all of the day's happiness. If it rains in the morning, Fret is very hungry. A hot, cold, wet or most any kind of an unfavorable morning gives Fret a great appetite. If you will look in the dictionary you will see that the name fret means to eat, to devour. If there is any happiness in your Zoo, Fret will soon eat it. He has a specializer in "His heart fretteth against the Lord." "The fire smoketh the fire smoketh the appetite for happiness. 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AUSTRIA AND GERMANY ON EVE OF BANKRUPTCY

LONDON, June 28.—A well-informed neutral banker, who returned recently from Vienna, gives the Times the following account of the financial position of Austria-Hungary and Germany:

"Money is plentiful in Austria—that is to say, paper money, and silver and nickel coins. More than \$1,500,000,000 of paper money has been issued in the Dual Monarchy since the beginning of the war. The gold covering for paper circulation has decreased during the same period from nearly \$350,000,000 to about \$150,000,000; but gold is needed only for purchases of food and war materials from abroad, and these are restricted to a minimum."

"At one moment, when the Russians were nearly through the Carpathian passes and people in Budapest were looking for dwellings as far south as Agram, the capital of Croatia, Austrian paper was at a discount of more than 40 per cent. in Roumania, Switzerland and other countries; but with the improvement of the military situation, the discount fell, and it now stands at about 20 per cent."

"If hostilities were to cease, and peace were to be signed tomorrow, Austria-Hungary would immediately become bankrupt. She might be able to pay a dividend of 11 per cent to her creditors, but not more."

"Germany would also be bankrupt, though in her case the dividend might be as high as fifteen or sixteen per cent."

"Austria-Hungary needs more than \$100,000,000 in gold every year for the service of her foreign trade alone, and all the large Austro-Hungarian banks have heavy gold debts abroad."

"Of course, Austrian and German financiers are buoyed up by the belief that a huge war indemnity will be secured, and that the enemy will have to pay for all their expenditures."

ABSALOM'S FAILURE
Lesson 1. July 4, 1915
2 Samuel 18:1-15. *Commit to memory v. 5

THE LESSON EXPLAINED
By Rev. J. M. Duncan, D. D.

Time and Place—About B. C. 1025; Mahanaim, a fortified town east of the Jordan, and its neighborhood.

Connecting Links—Ch. 11 closes with the story of the capture of Rabsiege in which Uriah lost his life (see chs. 11:22 to 12:7a, Lesson X, June 6). In chs. 13, 14, we have an account of the flight to Geshur from the king's anger, of Absalom, the third son of David (1 Chron. 3:2), and his return to Jerusalem three years later through the influence of Joab, David's nephew and general, to be reconciled to the king after two years further waiting. Ch. 15 begins the narrative of Absalom's defeat and the failure of his revolt. 1. Absalom's Father, 15.

Vs. 1, 2. David numbered the people; organized and reviewed his army. Captains of thousands, hundreds; the usual divisions of an army. Sent forth people; that is, the soldiers. David, in the dividing of the army into three parts, followed the example of Gideon (see Judg. 7:16) and Saul (see 1 Sam. 11:11). Under the hand of; under the leadership, command, of Joab Abishai; David's nephews (1 Chron. 2:16) and well known generals. Zeruihal; David's sister. Itai the Gittite; that is, a native of Gath. The refusal of this foreigner to leave David even when everything seemed to be going against the king is an example of unselfishness and intense personal devotion ranking with that of Ruth (see ch. 15:19-22. I will, go with you. The king did not feel strong enough to take the chief place, but he wished to have a share in the battle.

V. 3. Thou shalt not go forth. The soldiers dissuaded David from his purpose. See a similar protest in ch. 21:17. Not care for us. Even though the army should be defeated the purpose of the enemies would not be accomplished so long as David remained alive. Worth ten thousand of us; a common estimate of a valued leader. Better that thou succeed us. In addition to the army sent into battle in the three divisions, there was a body of reserves kept in Mahanaim (see Time and Place) under the king's personal command.

Vs. 4, 5. The king said, etc.; wisely yielding to the counsel of the soldiers. Stood by the gate side; of Mahanaim. An Eastern city had two gates, an inner and an outer. The servants of David followed him to follow his rebellious son. The wood (literally "the jungle") of Ephraim. The powerful tribe of Ephraim, though it dwelt west of the Jordan, had given its name to this place east of the river. It is not otherwise known.

Vs. 7, 8. People of Israel (the followers of Absalom) slain twenty thousand men; so that the rebel army was likely much larger than the king's even though the original 600 men of ch. 15:18 had been greatly reinforced. Scattered over all the country. The defeat became a rout. Wood devoured. Perhaps the meaning is that the fugitives dropped into the clefts between the rocks covering the surface of the region and concealed by the jungle growth. More than the sword. A greater number perished in the pursuit than in the battle.
