WASHINGTON, Jan. 8 (AP)—A mass meeting of 4,000 United States servicemen at Bataan, south of here on Luzon Island, tonight voted for full-page advertisements in United States newspapers to demand the resignation of Secretary Robert Patterson, and appealing to the American public for pressure on the government to speed the demobilization of overseas forces.
