OBITUARY.—A centenarian has passed away in the person of George Cannon, who died at Long River on the 24th August, 1901 in the home of his daughter, Mrs. David Marks in the one hundred and second year of his age. It is given to but few to live in three centuries. Mr. Cannon was born in the latter part of the eighteenth century and lived all through the nineteenth and thus far into the twentieth, was born at St. Eleanors and was one time the village blacksmith but would now be only remembered by the aged of that vicinity. Such a long life has possibly never been lived before in such an improving age. It would be bewildering indeed to compare the condition of things then to what they are today. It is from the sickle to the binder in all departments and conditions of life. For the past four years he was mostly confined to his bed and was tended and cared for by his devoted daughter, who with Mrs. William Brehaut of Summerside and four members abroad constitute the family. The service was conducted by the Rev. Edwin Smith and quite a number of carriages followed the bier to the Presbyterian Cemetery of New London, North. His end was peace.

EASTERN NOTES.—Harvesting is now general, some two weeks earlier than the average, as the dry and hot weather hurried the ripening of the grain at the expense of the straw.
