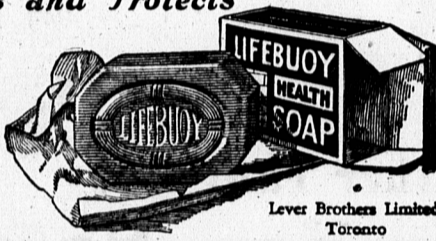

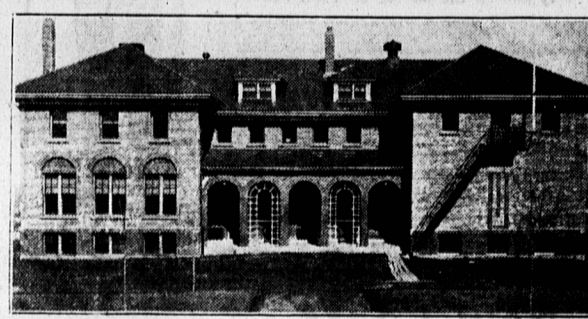

EASTERN NEWS.—One favorable feature of this unprecedented late lingering spring is the reasonably cheap hay in the eastern part of the island. Messrs. Jas. McAulay and Mr. Melius McLean Souris Line Road who disposed of some forty tons to the north side only charged \$10 a ton. Mr. Geo. Leslie also of Souris Line Road disposed of six stocks last week at a cost of not over \$10 a ton. There was activity in the potato market in Souris last week and up along the Elmira line, \$1.75 to \$2.00 was paid for some sorts. There were only few moving however. Potatoes are by no means plentiful. There is activity among the farmers in seed oats. One generous farmer at Big Pond sold a fine quality of seed oats to his neighbor mostly at 50c a bushel by measure, the weight bulk oats are fetching 60c a bushel in Souris. Some other farmers are asking 70c a bushel re-cleaned by weight of 34 lbs and are getting it readily. For these purchasing their seed this spring a big price is therefore being paid but it can't be helped.—In the last few weeks with improved weather and roads a good deal of cordwood was taken out on the Souris Line Road. Andrew McInnis and his boys took out as much as forty cords already and are still working. There is brisk demand for the wood at the various North Side lobster factories, as well as by the Souris householders \$5 to \$6 a cord is being paid depending on teams of delivery.—It is the intention to do away with the water tank at Harmony Jet and substitute an hydraulic outfit whether this will put the present pump-man, Mr. Plus McLean out of a job is not yet definitely known.—Mr. Stephen McAulay, contractor for the new St. Margaret's Church is getting his cement. The parish is furnishing the same and gravel. It is expected this work will be completed on the outside by Christmas eve and services held.—The packers have at last started in actively in pursuit of the North Side lobster business and are now busy building traps and getting wood and general supplies while
