## KNIGHTS OF PYTHIAS

## THE PRIZES AWARDED

### Excellent Parade in the Afternoon—Meetings Held.

At three o'clock yesterday afternoon Moulson Company, No. 2, Moncton; Frontier Co. No. 4, St. Stephen and Cynnet, No. 5, of St. John, commanded by Lt. Col. W. C. H. Grimmer with Major LeBaron Wilson, Adj. R. W. Grimmer and Com. Dr. F. A. Godsoe of St. John paraded to Victoria Park where inspection and competitive drill took place.

Moulson Company, No. 2, and Frontier Company No. 4, were the companies competing. Frontier Company No. 4 carried off first prize of \$25. A special prize was also awarded Moulson Company No. 2 of \$15. The Fowler cup formerly held by Fowler Company, No. 6 of Fredericton, N. B., goes to Frontier Company, St. Stephen.

The competing companies showed great proficiency in their drill and it was clearly evident that much time and pains has been taken in bringing the companies up to their present state of proficiency.

A regimental meeting of the First Maritime Regiment was held at the Hotel Davies at 7.30 last evening. Every fourth year an election of officers is held and in consequence the election was held yesterday evening. The meeting was called together by Lt. Col. W. C. H. Grimmer of St. Stephen.
