The Maritime Optimist is a bright publication established to sing a dirge over the graves of pessimists in the Maritime Provinces; and to dig a grave for cranks and kick them in. The Optimist is bright and will bring sunshine into many places where it is needed. An expression of opinion from one of its readers is as follows: Hundreds of ambitious young men have been obliged to leave these provinces because they could not find here the optimistic atmosphere where people thrive. Today they are to be found in every town of the West, foremost among those who are booming and building up those towns. They have gone where they are encouraged by words of hopefulness and faith to put forth the best that is in them. Under these conditions they undertake large things and accomplish them. Here in these provinces by the sea we have resources richer, more varied and more easily developed than in many places whose progress is so remarkable. We have also men who, in ability, in Canada, let us bring to our task the same optimism and energy that is being used in the progressive places of the West and we shall see growth.

On December 24th, there passed away at the City Hospital, Boston, Mass. James A. Fraser, after a brief illness of malignant cancer. Deceased was born at Invergorden, Scotland, in 1838, and removed to Los Angeles, Cal. in 1885, where he worked as dry goods salesman for a number of years. In 1896 he married Alice Ross, a daughter of the late Walter Ross of Eton, P. E. I., and removed to Boston, Mass. In 1898, where he followed his business until the autumn of 1904, when he was stricken with what his doctor, assisted by expert advice, recognized as locomotor ataxia. Mr. Fraser was removed to the home of his wife's brother, L. A. Ross, Eton, where he was confined to his bed in a helpless condition for two years. At the end of the time, on the advice of Dr. Carruthers, of Charlottetown he was removed to City Hospital, where after six months treatment under that skillful physician, he was restored to perfect health. About one year ago he returned to Boston and worked at his business until about one month ago, when he passed away. He leaves to mourn, his wife and one son. The funeral was from the home of Henry Finley, 1123 Massachusetts Avenue, Arlington, Mass. The many floral tributes and kind attention of friends showed the high esteem in which the deceased was held.—Com.

On the occasion of their leaving the Nova Scotia Agricultural College to return homelast week the students from this Province interjected a piece of novelty into the closing proceedings. A Halifax exchange says: A most interesting part of the proceedings occurred after the speeches in the pavilion when Theodor Ross, Secretary for Agriculture for P. E. I., who is in attendance at the short course, requested that the P. E. I. Island delegation, numbering sixteen students, might be granted an interview with Premier Murray. When assembled they Mr. Ross, on behalf of the P. E. I. Island students, expressed to the Premier in very felicitous language the keen sense of gratitude which the Island farmers felt towards the Nova Scotia Government for giving them an opportunity to attend the College on the same basis and subject to the same conditions as any student coming from the Province of Nova Scotia. He expressed high appreciation for the work of the teaching staff and the excellent facilities offered for agricultural instruction. He especially dwelt upon the excellence of the stock on the farm. He had visited Guelph College and although the stock here was not so numerous nor extensive, yet they had done better than those shown at Truro. Mr. Ross was followed by several of the students from P. E. I. Island, all speaking in the same strain, and expressing their thanks for the opportunities offered at the College.

The weather wise, or otherwise Examiner, which is rarely as accurate even as when it yesterday tried to set The Guardian right on low temperatures—itself sets the public astray when it says the lowest temperature registered this winter so far was nine above zero. As a matter of actual fact, vouched for by Mr. Newbery last night, the lowest that has been registered was eight above, on the 3rd inst. According to the report of the Health Officer of The City of Charlottetown, Dr. H. D. Johnson, there were fifty deaths in the City last year. Taking into consideration the fact that Charlottetown's population is 12,000, this is a very small death rate, and places this City amongst the healthiest in the Dominion. Of the total number of deaths fifty were attributable to throat disease—a rather high percentage, and one of the fifty there were twenty nine deaths from consumption, and a mild variety of smallpox, now fortunately conquered, but from these diseases there have been no fatal results. The Doctor recommended the adoption of a system of milk inspection and mentioned the importance of keeping backyards thoroughly clean.

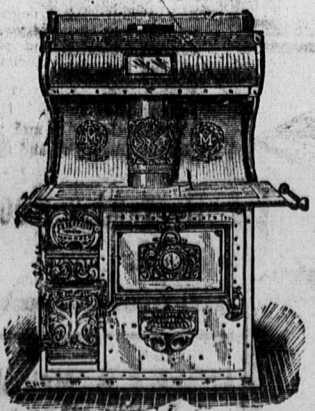
