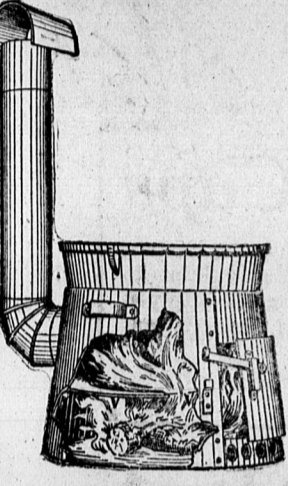

DAVIS & FRASER PLANT VISITED

tion of which there is cause for doubt, is marked "Held," and set apart for further examination, at the conclusion of which the inspector decides as to its disposition. Condensed carcasses and organs, as also any meats which are at any time found to have undergone such deterioration as to unfit them for human food, are tanked with the non-edible products, under the personal supervision of an inspector.

The knowledge of properly preparing a carcass so that inspection may be the more readily performed is positively necessary among stock raisers who wish to sell to the Davis and Fraser Co. The visitors yesterday were shown a few carcasses which were improperly dressed and the correct method was illustrated. It is necessary that the heart, lungs and liver remains intact, while the bowels are removed. The organs named are to be partly dressed but they must be attached to the trunk by the wind pipe. Should the organs be in the way they may be tied to the foreleg by a string, but they must be then attached to the body by their natural holdings. Carcasses not dressed in this manner are refused. By this method of dressing the inspector is enabled to observe the sub maxillary gland and the bronchial mediastinal and portal glands, these being the parts of the body which give first evidence of tubercle or other animal diseases.

Stock raisers may have the services of the inspector at their own places when killing in any quantity, the carcasses being stamped "Canada Approved," before they leave owners property. The firm invites inspection of their premises at any time and in visiting the plant consumers may observe the methods in which food is prepared and stock raisers can receive valuable hints as to dressing.

Davis & Fraser, by adopting the Government inspection system, have made possible the shipments of dressed meats outside the Maritime provinces to a much greater extent than heretofore. Dr. Bome stated yesterday that the supply of hogs was increasing yearly, now that there was a market ever available for their carcasses. This year he anticipates an even greater supply, than ever.

One thing which especially impressed the visitors of yesterday was the cleanliness and the almost perfect sanitary conditions. Every precaution is taken to have the preparation of meat conducted in a cleanly and thoroughly healthy manner. The rooms are all large and airy, with high ceilings, walls whitewashed, and floors, tables etc., scrupulously clean.

Speaking of the institution, Dr. Peibick, City, said that it compares favorably with any of the big establishments of its kind in Canada and Dr. Bome expressed himself similarly. Many more improvements are under contemplation and the firm will have a plant which will be equal to the best in the Dominion.

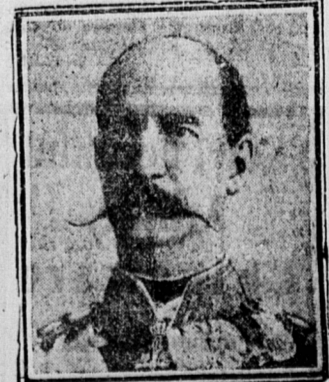
LAND OF HONEST MEN.

Perhaps the only country where you can occasionally see a king leaning out of a window of the royal palace and passing the time of day with his subjects is Montenegro, whose popular ruler has celebrated the completion of fifty years' reign by assuming kingly rank and title, says the European correspondent of the New York Sun. Normally the population of Cetinje, the capital is 2,500, but for the festivities 20,000 Montenegrins from all over the country assembled, decked out in their best multi-colored clothes, each man a small armory of knives and pistols, most of them a foot and a half long. It mattered little to the mountaineers that there was no sleeping accommodation in the town; they made themselves comfortable on the bare hillside. There is a beautiful simplicity of manners among the Montenegrin folk. Two American women managed to get a room to themselves. When they asked for a door key their host answered with a beaming smile: "We don't keep them. We only shut our doors because of the cold and to keep the dogs out." The next morning their host, the pink of courtesy, presented them with a rare luxury, an ancient toothbrush to use between them. Mirrors there are none in Montenegro, neither are there any trains or street cars. What seemed to impress the people vastly, says a correspondent, was the first watercart seen in the kingdom—a queer tin boiler affair bought for the festive occasion. It was drawn by two bullocks and filled by six men using old petrol cans. Afterwards a beddelloned official walked in front of it through the town, directing the men where to water the roads.

For six years there has not been a single case of robbery or burglary in Montenegro, there are at present only eight convicts in the Cetinje jail, all young men who have killed or maimed somebody in accordance with the Montenegrin vendetta. It is a queer sight to see them calmly strolling about the streets smoking cigarettes. They are led out for exercise every morning and afternoon, accompanied by one warder. Each of them drags an iron chain by his feet. The size of the chain varies according to the gravity of the offence. A man who has killed someone has a chain on each ankle. It makes a loud noise on the cobblestones, but the prisoners are quite unconcerned. They buy their own food, munch it calmly as they promenade along and stroll back into prison again when their time is up.

GREEK CABINET QUILTS.

ATHENS, Oct. 12.—The Greek cabinet of which Mr. Dragumis is premier, resigned today. The ministry was formed on January 31 last.



THE KING OF GREECE

The Vossische Zeitung, considered usually to be well informed, prints a telegram from its correspondent at Athens that the King of Greece intends to abdicate in favor of the Crown Prince, who was recently recalled to Athens by the King. According to the despatch, Mons. Dragumis, the Prime Minister, yesterday visited the King in an effort to persuade him to postpone the visit of the crown Prince for the reason that conditions are such that the visit might cause trouble. The correspondent continues that it was learned from an authoritative source that the King recalled the Crown Prince with the intention that when Parliament extended a request for the election of a new Chamber he would abdicate.
