## 300 WOUNDED AND SICK SOLDIERS AT HALIFAX

TWO OTHER SHIPS EXPECTED TO ARRIVE WITHIN TWENTY-FOUR HOURS.

HALIFAX, N. S., Nov. 29.—A steamship arrived yesterday with three hundred returned wounded and sick soldiers, some of them in a serious condition. Two died on November 26, and were buried at sea. They were Private Edward McGrath, of Whitby, Ontario, and Sapper William Howard, of England. Three hundred of the men leave for various points. Two other ships are expected within twenty-four hours.

The men from the last ship belonging in British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba left by rail.

### RACING TAXES IN THE U. S.

NEW YORK, Nov. 30.—Managing a race course is not all beer and skittles. In war times, according to reports from Latonia, where the taxes imposed by a number of official agents amounted to more than \$42,000. Part of this, about \$7,000, was collected from the public, but the remainder was State and municipal taxes. While this is a high rate of taxation compared with other sports, or even industries, it is only about one half of what Laurel will have to pay for his past meeting of 27 days. 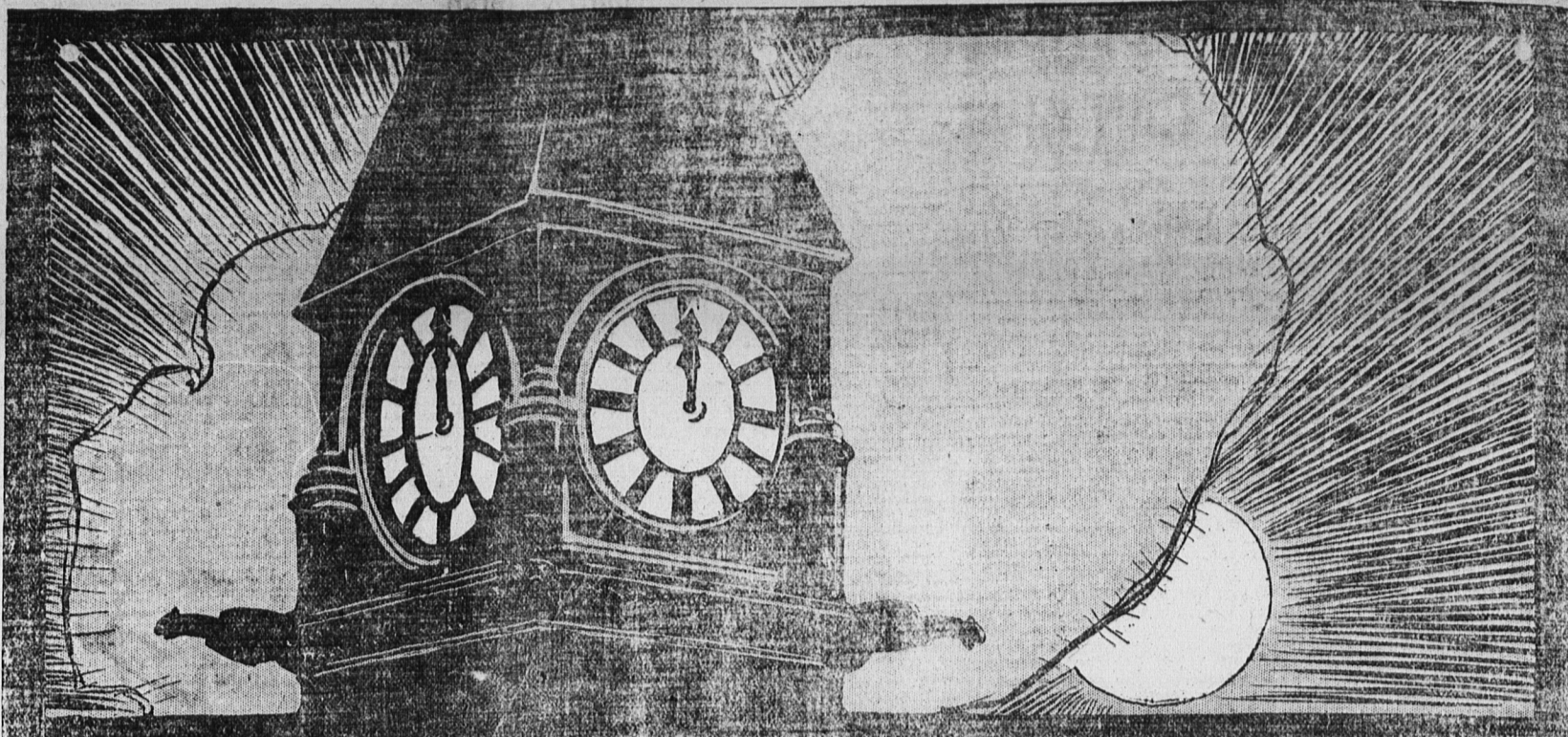

The recipe for Farina Pudding, mentioned above, is as follows:—

Farina Pudding—  
2 cups milk  
2 eggs  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
1 cup sugar  
1 cup cooked cream of wheat or farina

Put the milk in a double boiler, add sugar and farina. Stir until hot, add beaten eggs, and flavouring. Turn into a greased baker, and put in a moderate oven until brown.
