THE GUARD OF HONOR - At the closing of the House yesterday there was a good turn out of citizens, the weather being sunny and pleasantly warm. The visitors were especially pleased with the display. The Guard of Honor consisted of a hundred men drawn from the Prince Edward Island Regiment of which Colonel McLeod is in command. The Guard was commanded by Major T. B. Rogers with Captain W. J. MacDonald and Lieut. Fred Kelly. To stirring music played by the Regimental Band the Guard marched from the Drill Shed and were drawn up in line at the entrance of the Parliament Building to wait His Honour's arrival. The Lieutenant Governor and party left Government House at 1:40 p.m. In the first sleigh was the Usher of the Black Rod. In the second were His Honour's three Aides, Col. J. P. Hooper, Capt. J. R. Paton and Lieut. George H. Buntain, Naval Aide. In the third sleigh was His Honour accompanied by his chief aide, Lt. Colonel S. R. Jenkins and private secretary, Mr. H. L. Palmer. On the box was His Honour's coachman in winter livery and a military representative, Sergeant Major Barlow. Immediately on the arrival of the Lieutenant Governor at the building the firing of the salute of fifteen guns from the Park Roadway began. The firing party consisted of a detachment from the Prince Edward Island Heavy Brigade under command of Major P. W. McNevin. As the Lieutenant Governor stepped from his sleigh, and Band played the National Anthem, His Honour took the salute and entered the guard presented arms he entered the building and proceeded to the assembly Chamber, preceded by the Usher of the Black Rod.
