Fig-Leaves and Physiology.

Mrs. Lynn Linton has designated a certain section of the Woman's Rights party in America as the "Wild Women of the West." And the designation is not wholly unjust. Nevertheless there are among the rank and file of that party as noble-minded and pure-hearted women as ever lived; and despite the harsh aggressiveness with which some of them have proclaimed their belief in the "awful bifurcator" and all their "modern ideas" of dress, these ideas have made much headway and are now permeating the whole American mind. The first fruit of their preaching was the defeat of the crin-line Armada, which in the autumn of '92 threatened America with the craziest of recent Parisian follies, the revival of the hideous hoops.

Ever since its inception three years ago the Arena magazine has been the foremost of all the advocates of dress reform. Last month's number of this magazine is a dress-reform number par excellence. In this Arena Miss Emily A. Brac, M. D., declares that "more women die annually in our country from the effects of faulty dressing than from all contagious diseases combined." After detailing the grounds of this statement, she goes on to consider "the attributes of an ideal business and street dress."

First of all, its lines should follow a general way those of the undeveloped body, giving ample room everywhere for absolute freedom of motion and for the ever-recurring physiological congestions of the digestive tract. Its moderate weight should be supported by the shoulders, and the skirt attached to the waist should be sufficiently short to escape contact with the ground in walking, and stairs and steps in descending. It should furnish the maximum of warmth with the minimum of weight, should be suitable and becoming to the wearer, comfortable, graceful and picturesque, and form a harmonious whole, conveying to the observer some idea of the personality of the individual.

There ought, then, to be no prevailing fashion, but the custom of each person should be suited to her taste, character, and station. Dr. Bruce pronounces the modified Syrian dress a near approach to this ideal. Miss H. J. Westcott tells how she and three others started in Syrian dress for the World's Fair, apprehensive of the incivilities which the novelty might excite even in that gathering of all garbs and peoples. But in their whole trip of two weeks, during which they wore their suits on the trains, in the city and at the grounds, they had not one unpleasant experience to record. Mrs. R. O. Flower, who has worn the Syrian costume for eight months, finds "there is no social obstacle to absolute freedom in dress." She rejoices to know that "many women of high social standing while indulging in mountain climbing in Switzerland the past season, adopted a costume much more radical than any yet used in America." This is a belted sack coat, buttoned in front and ending at the knees, where it is met by high-top boots or long buttoned leggings. "The nearest approach to comfort in skirt form is the Grecian robe."

The end of it all will be, at least that the street-sweeping trains must go. To this end the wit of the newspaper cartoonist and paragonist is a powerful ally to the serious enthusiasm of the "Wild Women."

A recent "Judge" cartoon showed a lady dusting her train on her doorstep after a street walk, and depositing on the pavement cigar stumps, decayed rodents and all manner of unmentionables. And in another caricature, pictured a nimble negro on a New Orleans street corner, cutting a train in two at a single stroke, while the wearer walked on none the wiser, though the thief grinned as she fled with "a new dress for her J. m. m." Such slight exaggerations of real life are worth a hundred homilies from the "Wild Women of the West," and they are doing good.

CHURCH NEWS.

METHODIST

The will of the late Rev. Dr. Douglas has been filed. He bequeathes his entire estate to his wife, who is to enjoy the usufruct during her lifetime, and at her death it is to be equally divided among the surviving daughters, who will receive the interest upon it. If the married daughters leave no issue the remainder of the estate is to be consecrated as a permanent fund for mission work in the city of Montreal in connection with the Methodist Church of Canada.

Mr. Thomas Lafore, a colored Roman Catholic of New Orleans, La., who died January 1, left \$3,000 to the Freedmen's Aid and Southern Education Society, which is additional to \$500 before contributed. He also bequeathed \$5,000 and 24 lots to the Methodist Old Folk's Home in New Orleans.

The 205 sons of Methodist ministers in Toronto are made up as follows: One bishop, two country crown attorneys, one public school inspector, four graduates in dentistry, twelve in medicine, forty in art and law, three bankers, five insurance agents, six clergymen, three organists, one librarian, one government employee, and sixty students at various educational institutions.

The Methodist book and publishing house of Toronto announce the early issue of a volume memorial of the late Dr. Douglas of Montreal. The book will contain a biographical sketch and a number of selected sermons and addresses. Its publication will no doubt be awaited with interest by the many friends and admirers of the eloquent divine.

Rev. G. M. McGregor, of Aberdeen, Scotland, one of the best known clergymen of the Free church, has accepted a call to the pastorate of Dwight L. Moody's church in Chicago.

The Brooklyn Tabernacle has secured the services of the well-known evangelist, the Rev. B. Fay Mills, to fill Dr. Talmage's place during his absence.

A Presbyterian church consisting of Mexicans, has been established at Santa Fe.

The Presbyterian church of Wales has 1,285 churches and 139,658 communicants, an increase of 2,283; 292,628 adherents, an increase of 4,443; and 192,000 Sunday school scholars. There are 716 ordained ministers and 3591 preachers. Its foreign mission work in India includes 86 organized churches and 7,400 persons in the congregations.

About four thousand francs has been raised to establish the little hospital for sick foreign travellers which it has been proposed to attach to the American Presbyterian Mission at Tabreez, Persia, in memory of the late Theodore Child who when he fell ill of cholera was taken in there and

nursed for seven weeks. Dr. Eaton, the great missionary to the New Hebrides, is speaking effectively to large assemblies in Great Britain. Up to January 18, he had secured \$15,000 for the evangelization of islands in the South Seas. A good part of this is to go to the supporting of the steam vessel, "Day Spring," which is to be used for missionary purposes.

EPISCOPAL. Mrs. Binney, widow of the late bishop of Nova Scotia, leaves for England in April to reside there permanently. The Rev. F. Wilkinson, curate of St. Philip's church, Toronto, has been offered the incumbency of Christ church, Dartmouth, N. S. In St. Paul's Church, Halifax, "Prohibition" is the all-absorbing topic at present.

The Church Missionary Society has received intelligence of the deaths of Rev. E. W. Methias, who was on his way from the Lagos to the Niger; of Rev. J. Vernal, who has labored in Lagos since 1886; and of Miss Manbridge, another of Bishop Hill's party of recruits.

St. George's Church, New York, the Rev. Dr. W. B. Rainford, rector, has begun a new service, which will be conducted by one of the assistant clergy of the parish at the early hour of 9.30, and will consist of the saying of the Litany, and the delivery of a regular sermon. The aim is to provide for a class of persons whose Sunday duties prevent attendance at the later and usual hour.

Miss Gedge, sister of Mr. Sydney Gedge, is to go out immediately to Lagos to take charge of the training institution which Mrs. Hill, the wife of Bishop Hill, intended to make her special care.

The assistant editor of the Philadelphia Ledger is a son of Archbishop Farrer. St. Paul's Cathedral, London, has a new clock, the old works, after 182 years' continuous service, being worn out. The clock is the largest in the kingdom; its pendulum is fifteen feet long, weighs seven cwt., and has a two-second beat. The dial and hand of the old clock are used, and "Great Paul" still strikes the hours.

BAPTIST. Last Sunday, Deacon George W. Chipman of Boston, said that "the contract for rebuilding Tremont Temple had been given to a Baptist firm, the architect was a Baptist, and he hoped the Temple would be Baptist."

The Rev. E. G. Robinson, D.D., LL.D., on reaching the fifteenth anniversary of his marriage, recently, received \$2,500 from friends, and an annuity of \$500 from John D. Rockefeller.

The Clarendon Street Baptist church, of Boston, of which Dr. A. J. Gordon is pastor, gave last year to foreign missions \$20,000. Its own expenses were between \$9,000 and \$10,000, and this includes \$1,300 to its pastor.

As a result of the Chapman revival in Detroit, seven Baptist churches received 240 additions.

The minister, whose sermon is stated to have been the chief cause of the conversion in Colchester, of the late Pastor C. H. Spurgeon, died a short time ago at the Parsonage, Higher Ardwick, Manchester. His name was Rev. Robert Eglen and he was born in Norfolk in 1815. He was highly esteemed.

According to the "Baptist Handbook of England and Wales," there has been a general growth. The membership has advanced from 337,409 to 432,507, the Sunday School scholars from 487,801 to 495,284, and the pastors in charge of churches from 1,858 to 1,851.
