The Markets

MONTREAL, QUE., July 19.—The export trade in grain in the Montreal market today showed no marked improvement, but there continued to be a steady inquiry from some foreign sources and some business was worked in Manitoba spring wheat, American new crop winter wheat and Canadian rice. There was no further change in the condition of the market for coarse grains, prices generally being steady with a moderate amount of trading in car lots. The demand for spring and winter wheat grades of flour continued quiet, but prices were unchanged. The undertone to the mill feed market continued strong owing to the good inquiry from all sources, the demand for standard grades rolled oats was limited and prices were steady. Prices for all grades of eggs were well maintained under a quiet demand the receipts were 935 cases. Owing to the continued indifferent demand for butter from all sources, and the steady accumula-

The volume of the business was small. Eastern Townships No. 1 pasteurized was quoted at 34c to 34 1/2c per pound. The receipts were 634 packages. There is an increased inquiry from English importers for cheese, but as the prices bid were not satisfactory the volume of business was small. It was reported that further sales of Western No. 1 grades were made to United States buyers at 18 1/2 cents per pound waxed. The spot market was quiet but steady. Western grades were quoted at 18 1/2 cents to 18 3/4 cents and Eastern qualities at 18 to 18 1/2 cents per pound. The receipts were 1488 boxes.

OTTAWA, Ont., July 19. (Eggs)—No further change is reported from Canadian egg markets today. A car is offered from Manitoba at extras 31 1-2, firsts 29 1-2, seconds 27 1-4, f.o.b. but no sales are reported as prices are too high.

TORONTO—Market is quiet, prices to retailers are extras 38, firsts 35, seconds 30-31.

MONTREAL—The egg market is steady. Dealers are being made in a jobbing way at extras 34 1/2, firsts 31 1/2, seconds 29. The West is asking 27 1/4 for seconds on this market.

WINNIPEG—This market is steady with dealers quoting country shippers, extras 28 to 29, firsts 26 to 27, seconds 21 to 23.

SASKATOON—Prices remain firm with a good consumptive demand. Prices to retailers are extras 35, firsts 33, seconds 28 to 29.

CALGARY—Dealers are now quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs delivered cases returned, extras 28, firsts 25, seconds 20. Prices to retailers are extras 37, firsts 35, seconds 29.

VANCOUVER—Dealers continue to quote producers for ungraded eggs delivered cases returned, extras 28, firsts 26, pullet extras 23 to 24.
