This is certainly a good move in the right direction. The society will see that the district will be well canvassed and that this prisoner will receive immediate succor from the people of his native place. The Red Cross Society established in Egmont Bay sometime ago is making itself noticeable and the members are busy in getting up all kinds of serviceable goods for the relief of our boys at the front.
