Germans Close Czech Academies After Outbreaks

Nine Shot In Demonstrations In Protectorate Of Bohemia-Moravia.

BERLIN, Nov. 17 (AP)—Nine Czechs have been shot to death as a result of "demonstrations" and "resistance" to German authority in the protectorate of Bohemia-Moravia, heart of the former Czech-Slovak republic, the German news agency announced tonight.

The agency said that this and other extraordinary measures, including arrests of a large number of persons and the closing for three years of Czech academies, had been sufficient to restore order in Prague, the former Czech capital.

UNABLE TO FLY PLANES INTO CANADA

Warcraft Must Be Wheeled Across Border To Avoid Neutrality Law

OTTAWA, Nov. 17 (CP)—Technicians of the United States neutrality act forbid flying warplanes that Canada and Great Britain may buy in the United States across the international boundary, and Canadian government officials, like United States airplane manufacturers and munitions export licence board officers, have given the matter careful study.

Normal transportation of the planes, such as by railway flatcars and Great Lakes freighters offers no difficulties, but in that case the planes would have to come ashore and would be assembled at some Canadian airport or transhipped to an ocean freighter for transfer to England or France.

Al Capone Under Care At Mental Hospital

BALTIMORE, Nov. 17—Behind a barrier of secrecy, "Scarface" Al Capone, ruler of Chicago's gangland in the fabulous days of prohibition, tonight began treatment at the Johns Hopkins Hospital. The 38-year-old former gangster was admitted to the hospital after his release by federal authorities at Lewisburg, Pa., where reported to have been joined by another brother and taken quarters at a midtown hotel.

LONDON, Nov. 17 (CP Cable)—The inter-allied war council today decided to pool the economic resources of Great Britain and France in their war against Nazi Germany, bringing cooperative efficiency in 11 weeks to a point reached only after three years of the first Great War.

On the war front, the Air Ministry announced that "an important German naval base" had been successfully photographed by the Royal Air Force during the day.
