HOW BRIBE MONEY IS SPENT.

It has been common enough to say that the campaign funds of political parties are usually distributed something after the manner that a sailor once described the distribution of prize money in the navy—"It is sifted through a ladder; what goes through is for the officers; what remains on the rungs goes to the men." Henry Dalby, a former editor of the Montreal Star and the Conservative organizer for Quebec in the election of 1900, confirms this opinion in his new weekly paper, The Argus. He graphically illustrates how it works out. A wealthy citizen desiring to establish a claim upon his party hands over, say \$10,000 to the party's principal agent. The agent reflects

that he himself has been working for his party a long time and the party has done nothing for him. It is time he was laying by something for his old age. He puts away five thousand for that purpose and divides the other five thousand among five workers of the second class.

These second-class workers have first class ideas as to providing something for old age. Each of them puts aside five hundred out of the thousand entrusted to him, and passes on five hundred to say five workers of the third class. The third-class men think that about seventy-five dollars of the hundred each has received should be laid aside as provisions for a rainy day. This leaves only twenty-five with which to convince the ordinary free and independent electors. This mostly goes to men who avow themselves life long friends of the party but who expect to be paid for their day. Thus according to Mr. Dalby, and he ought to know, only a few dollars out of \$10,000 really reaches the purchasable voters. Most of it sticks to the hands of the first, second and third-class workers in sums rapidly diminishing from the top downward.

There is probably much truth in the picture even if it is a little overdrawn. The proverbial "honor among thieves" is not always found among those who handle bribery funds. Of course there are ostensibly no bribery funds—they are all for "legitimate expenses" until they are unveiled in the election courts. And what can be more "legitimate" than these prudent provisions for the old age of otherwise unfortunate and neglected election workers? The one relieving feature of the case as presented by Mr. Dalby is that while it presents the party workers in the light of the thieves and bootleggers, it reduces the number of bribed electors far below what has been ordinarily estimated. There is not in the ordinary election money enough to go far in bribing individual electors after the campaign workers have heaped themselves.

Hon. Joseph Rea has returned from his trip to purchase hay in Quebec and the Manager of the Intercolonial has promulgated the regulations under which it will be transported free over that road. The main provisions are that the hay must be purchased by and consigned to the Government or its authorized agents and sold at cost, only to farmers whose hay crop has failed to such extent as to prevent them sustaining their live stock by the product of their farms.

The Examiner is wrong in saying that The Guardian maintains that the Grand Trunk Pacific contract cannot be abrogated. We did point out that we did not see how it could be got rid of except by mutual consent and invited The Examiner to tell us Mr. Borden himself says that "vested rights must be observed and the sanctity of contract must be respected." That is sound doctrine. Mr. Borden contends, however, that should the people at the polls so decide, "the undertaking may be expropriated." This we have never denied. But when was expropriation ever used taken on such a scale and under such circumstances? Canada is a constant borrower in the English money market, and a resort to expropriation of a public enterprise in which many millions of English capital are embarked might greatly prejudice our financial interests. We cannot think the contract will ever be abrogated except by mutual consent.
