The annual Civil Service Examinations will be held in Charlottetown beginning the second Tuesday in November. Applications must be sent to the Secretary of the Civil Service Commissioners at Ottawa not later than the 15th of October.
The Black Diamond line steamer Bonavista, Capt. D. C. Fraser, arrived in port early last evening from St. John's, Nfld. She has a large list of passengers most of whom are bound for Montreal and points west. After cooling at International pier the Bonavista sailed this morning for Montreal.—Sydney Record.

ST. JOHN GLOBE: One report is that Mr. Stavert is to join the Merchants' Bank, Montreal, of which Mr. Fyche was until lately manager. Another report is that he will enter the service of the Bank of Montreal. It is said, Mr. McNeill, formerly inspector, now Mr. Clouston's chief lieutenant, is to retire, and that possibly Mr. Stavert will secure his place. This is all conjecture, however. The general belief is that it is the Merchants' Bank Mr. Stavert will join.

ONE hundred and twenty-five vessels have been added to the Newfoundland registry during this year, which promises to be a record one in this respect. Of this number seventy-three have been built in the island, while the others have been purchased in Canada and St. Pierre. The increase over other years is probably due to the high price of fish which prevailed last season, and induced many planters to invest in a schooner. The last addition is the Lella and Maud, of Arichat. She is a schooner of 38 tons.

REV. E. S. WHITEHOUSE, the new pastor of the first Baptist Church, Moncton, preached his introductory sermons there Sunday and was listened to by large congregations. He created a very favorable impression. A formal reception will be tendered by the congregation on Friday evening next. Mr. Whitehouse is unmarried, but is to wed on November 8th next Mrs. Grace Greenwood Harrison, daughter of Hon. E. W. Greenwood of Troy, New York, the ceremony to take place at Mr. Greenwood's summer residence.

The markets for butter, cheese and eggs are very much stiffer locally and prices have advanced. Dairy butter is a very scarce article, in fact dealers here say it is almost impossible to obtain. Those having any in stock here are getting 20 cents for it and hold it firmly at that. The factories are now quoting 22 cents for creamery solids and they are jobbing here at 23 to 24 cents. Creamery prints, 24 cents. Eggs are now quoted at 19 cents in Charlottetown and the markets remain firm and unchanged. They are jobbing here at 20 cents, with the prospects of being 21 before long. Cheese is at a deadlock. Factories in the Maritime Provinces are asking 12 cents for large, and 12 1/2 for twins. Prices here are now about on a par with factory prices as yet however. Business all around is pretty good. A prominent dairy concern from New Brunswick have recently opened up here, and they are reported to be cutting prices to some extent.—Halifax Chronicle.

It is estimated that the total output of cheese this season will be but twenty-five per cent that of last year, but the price will be 24 cents per lb more, or about twenty-five per cent. Owing to the poor prices of previous seasons a number of farmers became discouraged and went out of the business. Now they are repenting of their course, and next year will be in it again. This season the English market which serves as a guide for the Canadian market has been better for cheese than for butter. It is expected that cheese making will be kept up until the end of October at least.
