Eggs took a drop to 30 cents per dozen while chicken and fowl were disposed of at from \$1.20 to \$2.00 a pair. Beef by the quarter brought from \$4 to 5 cents per pound. Eleven and a half cents a pound was paid for hides. This was practically all offered for sale.

AN INTERESTING PROGRAM.—An exceptionally interesting program of pictures was shown at the People's Theatre last night, one of the best being a highly entertaining and instructive film, "Liquid Air." In this picture a piece of lead wire is reduced to a temperature of 228 degrees (F.) below zero in the form of liquid, with its peculiarly powerful characteristics. Malleable zinc immersed in the liquid becomes extremely brittle, and if the same effect is exercised on steel can be broken with a hammer. One of two live eels, which have been in the liquid and are frozen to the point of fragility, is put into water. It instantly revives. The other would break into pieces as the would break a stick. The picture of some which have been "treated" resemble bits of glass. A piece of lead wire is made into a spring and broken. It can then bear a weight of 24 pounds. Taken away from the cold into a warm temperature, it immediately resumes its elasticity and the weight it falls. The film was exceedingly interesting and one that would appeal to the student. The other pictures were splendid and included the eighth installment of "Mary."

STEAMER TAKES FINAL PLUNGE.—HALIFAX, March 20.—With a roar and crash, the wrecked steamer City of Sydney which went on the Cambro reefs a few days ago, split in two this morning and plunged into the sea.
