Canada's Permanent Home In Washington

(Canadian Press.)
WASHINGTON, April 18.—A handsome, gray-stone building in the diplomatic quarter changed hands yesterday and Canada acquired a permanent home in the United States capitol. It is a five-story, forty room house, built last year, and equipped with such modern things as telephone exchange and elevator so that the business offices of the legation can be opened at once. The address is 1746 Massachusetts Avenue. The purchase price of the new legation is understood to have been around \$470,000 including furniture and equipment.

Tryon Tid Bits

Beautiful and prosperous Tryon—"Good old Tryon" as many residents fondly term it is one of the islands' oldest settlements, dating back to the days of French control when P. E. I. was Isle St. Jean. In the forward march Tryon has always kept a leading place, and today it is one of the most beautiful and prosperous rural communities of our fair Island Province. Tryon point: in my boyhood days a favorite resort of picnickers is ne of P. E. I.'s beauty spots. Tryon river, winding through its dyked marshlands. (These dykes were the work of the former Acadian residents) to Northumberland abounds in trout as many disciples of Isaac Walton can testify, while on every hand are prosperous looking farms, and homes. The spiritual needs of the community are administered to by three churches, two United and one Baptist, education by the Tryon Consolidated School and North Tryon school. In the several well equipped general stores one may find all goods usually carried in stock by country merchants. Nearby the Baptist church may be found H. A. The North Tryon roller mill, one of the first roller process mills established in the province, does a thriving business and right alongside the Ives Saw mill and Sash & Door Factory is open for business six days a week. Pooley's Garage equipped for service can do any kind of motor, battery repair work, and is also fitted with an Oxy-acetylene welding outfit. The proprietor, Will A. Pooley, also does a large business in Motor cars (Ford) and farm machinery (I. H. C.) as well as handling a complete line of gas oils and motor supplies. While showing me through his garage a few days ago Mr. Pooley informed me that he intended, if possible, to add 25 feet to the building to accommodate the increasing volume of business. It speaks well for Tryon that such a business can ex-


