BRITISH SAVIOURS OF THE HUMAN RACE

OTTAWA, Jan. 16.—Baron Ito and Dr. Hishida, members of a special Japanese finance commission to the United States, met members of the Dominion government at a dinner given in their honor by Yasutara Numano, Japanese consul-general for Canada at the Chateau Laurier. Among the guests were Sir Thomas White, Sir Charles Fitzpatrick, Hon. F. B. Carvell, Hon. J. A. Calder, Hon. Arthur Meighan, Hon. Martin Burrell, Hon. A. K. MacLean and Hon. Justice Duff. Baron Ito said: "I firmly believe that when the history of the war is written generations yet unborn will turn to the British Empire and hail her as the saviour of the human race."
