MRS. GEORGE KELLY. The death occurred in the Charlottetown Hospital Sunday evening, of Mrs. Kelly, aged 35, beloved wife of Mr. George Kelly, who is employed in the P. E. I. R. Round House. She leaves besides her husband, two young children to mourn.

WOUNDED IN ARM. Mr. J. A. Holmes of Lot 31, Hampshire has received word that his son Lance Corporal Ira L. Holmes cavalry is officially reported admitted to 14 General Hospital, Wimereux, Oct. 13th, gunshot wound left arm. L. Corp. Holmes joined up with the Light Horse, leaving with his battalion from Regina.

BAD FIRE. Fire broke out a little after midnight yesterday morning in the outbuilding of Parkside Farm, near Summerside, owned by Mr. Thomas Mitchell. The Summerside Fire Brigade was called out and they succeeded in saving the residence. The barn, however was completely destroyed together with all the stock, consisting of three cows, four pigs, horse and about 100 hens, farm implements, hay and grain. The loss is estimated at \$3000 without insurance.

GOOD NEWS RECEIVED. It was with feelings of relief that Salisbury friends learned this week that Earl D. McPhee, of Tryon, P. E. I., had not been killed in action, as some were led to believe. Mr. McPhee, however, is suffering with gun shot wounds in the ankle. Mr. McPhee was principal of the Salisbury Superior School some years ago, and was undoubtedly one of the most popular teachers that ever handled the school. He was preparing himself for the Baptist ministry when he enlisted for overseas duty—Moncton Transcript.

England with the 105th Battalion. In November of the same year he went to France where he was attached to the 13th Royal Highlanders. With that Battalion he went through some very severe engagements and Passchendaele. At Lens, in 1917, he received gun-shot wounds in the head, but, after six weeks in the Base Hospital, France, he returned to the front line with the pluck of a veteran. He remained on duty until he fell on the field of valor on August 30th, at the early age of twenty-one years, after seeing twenty-one months of trench warfare. Having played a hero's part he now rests under a white cross "Somewhere in France." There are left to mourn besides a sorrowing father and mother and a wide circle of friends, five brothers and four sisters namely: Mrs. R. A. Ragnall, Radisson, Sask.; Mrs. Angus MacLeod, New Bedford, Mass.; Dan, of North Battleford, Sask.; Nettie, Edyth, Lloyd, George Alden and Benj. at home.
