The regret of officers and men of his Battalion the 13th R. H. C. for the loss of their comrade on "Hill 70" on Aug 15th has been tendered the sorrowing family, through the chaplain, Capt. C. E. Graham.

The sorrow of his parents, sisters brothers and friends is assuaged as far as these things bring comfort, by the knowledge of the service this noble young man rendered to the cause of righteousness. In the final contrasting of life's values he indeed won the highest reward.

John C. was a worthy son, kind and dutiful in the home, genial and wholesomely among his companions. When the call came for men, he was among the first in his community to respond. He enlisted Nov. 17th, 1915, a week later he began to train in Charlottetown.
