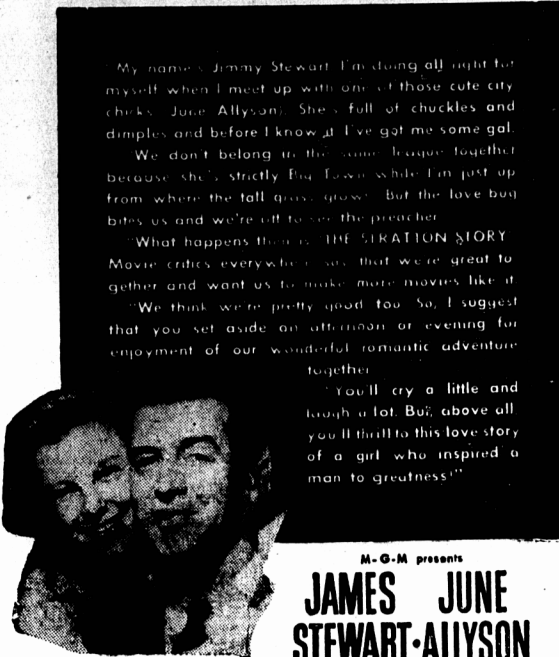

BARN DESTROYED BY FIRE - A serious loss was sustained by Mr. Frank MacDonald, Georgetown Royalty farmer, on Thursday evening, when fire destroyed his large barn, which also housed stock and machinery. Mr. MacDonald was in Georgetown at the time the fire broke out, which was approximately 7:15 P. M.; the blaze was quickly noticed by residents of the surrounding country and citizens of Georgetown, many of whom first thought it was a brush fire. Passing motorists brought the word to town that a large barn was on fire; a crowd quickly gathered as all means of transportation were pushed into use but the flames had made such rapid progress that apart from hauling a wagon from the barn, nothing else was salvaged. A pig-pen opposite the barn was also destroyed and four pigs it contained. Three horses were in the building at the time, two owned by Mr. MacDonald and the third belonging to Mr. Malcolm MacLean of Georgetown. Those three fine animals met death in the flames. Farm machinery and tools were also lost. A large quantity of straw and hay in the barn loft, threshing on the farm had been completed a few days ago and some 800 bushels of oats was in bins. A large proportion of this was burned but it was later learned that a considerable amount will be salvaged. The combined efforts of those present succeeded in saving the outbuilding. The origin of the fire is unknown.

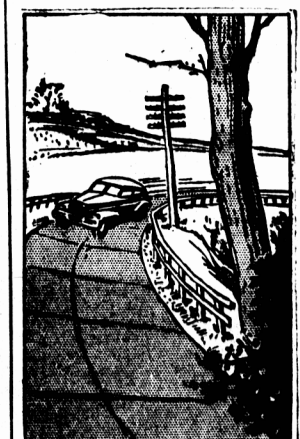

Expect Few Surprises in New Budget

(By D'Arcy O'Donnell) OTTAWA, Oct. 18 - (CP) - Members of the Commons expect few, if any, major surprises in the speech Finance Minister Abbott will make Thursday, Oct. 20, in reintroducing the 1949-50 budget.

The members, in views expressed in parliamentary debates, have indicated that any changes in the budget, first presented March 22, will be minor and of only limited interest.

They believe no change will be made, for instance, in personal income tax rates, in corporation and excise taxes or tariffs. Income and excise tax rates were cut in the original budget and are not likely to be altered for the current year. Corporation taxes were adjusted and they probably will be left alone.

Tariffs, an important budgetary item before the war, now have become mainly a matter for international agreement.

U. S. Merchant Fleet Becoming Obsolete

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18 - (AP) - A Senate commerce sub-committee said Saturday the war-built merchant fleet of the United States already is becoming obsolete and a replacement program is in order.

In a preliminary report on a continuing investigation of merchant marine problems, the group stressed increased foreign competition since the end of the war.

The committee said a replacement program of new ship construction would "prevent the danger of having, once again, an old fleet at the start of a conflict" in which there might not be time to get ready.

Mrs. A.B. Coles was hostess to the members of North Milton W.I. on Thursday evening Sept. 29th.

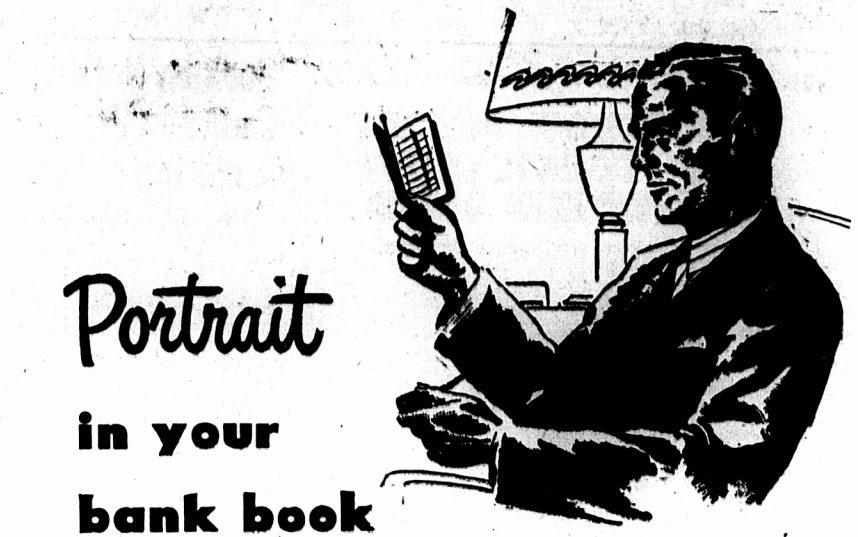

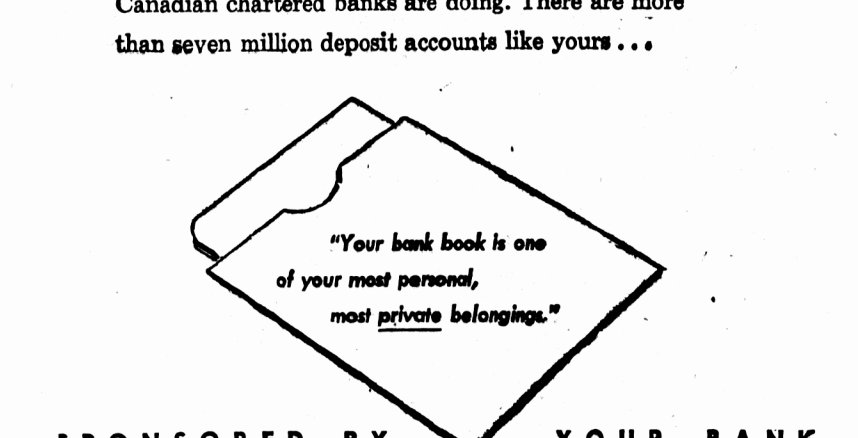
