How Bees Spend The Winter

(Experimental Farms Note)
Honey bees do not hibernate in the true sense of word for they move about within the hive and are continually taking food during the winter months. As the winter approaches and the temperature within the hive hovers between 69 and 57 degrees Fahrenheit, the bees remain quietly on their combs but as soon as it drops to 57 degrees or lower the bees gather together into one compact cluster. The bees in the centre of this cluster produce heat by muscular activity while those on the outside act as an insulating ring. The temperature of the cluster is maintained at approximately 57 degrees throughout the winter. The colder the hive the harder must the bees work to keep up the necessary temperature, but as work shortens a bee's life and because it is necessary that they live through the long winter and well into the following spring, it is imperative that the beekeeper have his colonies strong in young bees when winter arrives, and that sufficient protection is provided to maintain the proper temperature of the hive with the least expenditure of energy on the part of the bees.
