### DEPARTMENT OF P. H.

Sir, it seems to me that the suggestion of Mr. Percy Pope, at the annual meeting of the Red Cross Society on Tuesday evening, is a good one. We have a healthful climate and we have been careless about health. I see by your report that it was stated by Miss Wilson that there are today on this Island over seven hundred sufferers from tuberculosis. That is to say there are seven hundred persons whose lives will certainly be cut short unless early special means are adopted for their relief and cure. Then there is the damper that smallpox will, one of these years, sweep away many of those who remain unvaccinated. And there are other causes demanding the establishment of a Department of Health, as advocated on Tuesday evening by Mr. Pope.

The adoption of a vigorous policy for the reduction of disease and the promotion of health is therefore desirable when we consider the value—the material value—which even one human life may be to a community. We will not grudge the few thousands of dollars a year which a Department of Health, active in the work of maintaining good health throughout the community will cost. The preservation of health is a public, as well as a personal, duty.

The Red Cross Society has done, and is doing, much for Prince Edward Island and its people. But the supervision of a Department of Health would add to its effectiveness as well as to the promotion of the Province.

In connection with it, the welfare of children, practically those of neglectful parentage and those who are orphans, might be given better oversight than they receive at present.
