Former Premier Bids for Power

MELBOURNE, Australia, Sept 9.—(CP)—James Henry Scullin is making his bid for a return to the premiership of Australia on a far-reaching proposal for reorganization of the Commonwealth Bank making banking virtually a monopoly of the state.

His opponents declare this platform is framed to secure the support of the extreme elements among prominent, sometimes up-and-downers, in the Labor party, and thereby destroy any claim to leadership by J. T. Lang, the fiery ex-premier of New South Wales.

Whether this be so or not, it is a fact that ever since he achieved the leadership of the Labor party in 1928, Mr. Scullin has been dogged by the persistence of extreme Laborites. While he was in power from 1929 to 1931, the extremists pushed so far to the front that moderate Laborites defected.

Mr. Scullin's career was one long battle for a middle course. The party was too much for him. Now, his opponents charge, he has capitulated. He Scullin has had many clashes in late years. The sections have been holding aloof for a long time, but it is conceivable that if the present ministry is overthrown at all, it will be a combined Labor force, in which event the issues of 1931 will in all likelihood be repeated.

In the first elections as leader of the Labor party, Mr. Scullin secured more seats for his party than any other group, but was unable to beat off the Nationalist-Country Party coalition. In 1929, however, Labor secured the majority in the house. As the months went on to the general elections of 1931, Mr. Scullin saw his following dwindle, with defections on both sides—by Mr. Lyons, and the so-called extremists.

Like his chief opponent, Mr. Lyons, the Labor head is a native Australian. He lived and worked on a farm near Ballarat, where he was born in 1876. In Ballarat he commenced to make a reputation as a speaker and formed a branch of the Labor party there, entering parliament in 1910. He was defeated in 1913, but returned to the house in the Camberra house since.

He is a small man, with an agreeable personality, rather dim of speech. He is fond of music, and for 14 years was an adjudicator of oratorical competitions at Ballarat. He is married, his wife being the former Marie MacNamara of Ballarat; and the couple have three children. He likes walking, bowls and reading.
