SOME OF THE NEW THINGS TO BE SEEN AT MY STORE

Jackets—Semi-fitting backs is the correct thing, with a number of rows of stitching across the bottom and cuffs. They are made of Beaver Cloth, in all shades.

Capes—Golf Capes are very fashionable. Cloth Capes of three quarter lengths with a full shaped flounce are the very newest novelty.
