Late in the day the Gas Stocks became fairly active, Consolidated Gas advancing at one time about 2 1/2 points based on talk of a higher dividend as resulting from the recent increases in the dividends of its subsidiary companies. The known movement of money by local banks for the week ending yesterday showed a gain in cash of about five millions. This probably forecasts a favorable bank statement tomorrow. CHICAGO, Dec. 23.—Wheat—While the market has ranged higher, trade has been extremely light, offerings being scant, the market advanced easily on any buying by the bulls. While the Northwest Stocks increased for the week, 1,280,000 bushels southwestern stocks are falling on shown a decline in Kansas and Oklahoma and fair weather officially forecast for all the winter wheat belt. Foreign markets all generally higher. Corn—Has ruled firmer with moderate buying by shorts. Offerings were very light. News from Argentine continues bullish. Oats—Scattered longs selling December and buying May, while elevator concerns have been moderate buyers of December against sales of May. Provisions—Shorts were early buyers but offerings were few, which eased the market some. Trade expected larger run within next few days. A. O. S. & CO.
