Associated Study Club Hold Meetings

The regular monthly meeting of the Associated Study Club of Hope River took place in Hope River Parish Hall on Feb. 16, 1937 with a large and enthusiastic attendance representing the districts of St. Ann's, St. Patrick's, Millvale, St. Mary's and Mayfield.

It was very pleasing and encouraging to note from these reports that each Club was concerned primarily with Credit Union as its chief study.

Following these reports Mr. Murphy then said that the general agenda of the meeting of the Clubs had as its primary feature the one reading of two papers: the one prepared and to be read by Mr. Thomas McAvinn, B.A., entitled: "How a Credit Union differs from a Bank."

Mr. McAvinn's dissertation of his subject disclosed very obviously to his audience that he was quite conversant with this matter and thoroughly acquainted with the facts of Credit Union.

"Credit Unions differ from banks," the reader said, "in that they promote systematic thrift by encouraging their members to lay aside small sums of money at regular intervals, thus creating a fund to meet their credit needs by providing them with loans for productive and profitable purposes.

Mr. Goodman was then called on to read his paper in which he clearly and concisely outlined the purpose and objects to be attained by Study Clubs and how by inculcating the principles of Credit Union, the noxious theory of modern capitalism—"starvation in the midst of plenty"—may be erased.

The secretary, Mr. O'Connor, in remarks that followed complimented the papers read by Mr. McAvinn and Mr. Goodman, the former as one typical of a scholar, the latter as that of a man of vast and varied experience.

The meeting then adjourned with the singing of the National Anthem.
