MENTALLY ILL COSTLY EDMONTON, Dec. 2 — (CP) — The cost of caring for the mentally ill in Canada may reach \$100,000,000 annually in the next 10 years, Dr. C. M. Hincks of Toronto said in an interview here today. General director of the national committee for mental hygiene in Canada, he said \$30,000,000 to \$40,000,000 now is being spent annually by various governments in the Dominion for diagnosis, treatment and rehabilitation of mental patients.

PIERCES SONIC BARRIER

MUROC AIR BASE, Calif. Dec. 2 — (AP) — Skimming like a hummingbird only 30 feet off the ground, a navy Douglas Skyrocket has pierced the sonic barrier. While navy officials were silent, competent observers put the speed of the D-55-32 at between 760 and 800 miles an hour. The speed of sound at Muroc's 2,300-foot altitude and 55-degree temperature was figured at 757 miles an hour. Test pilot, Eugene F. May, 45, was at the controls of the rocket and jet-powered plane.
