Potato Yields Are Below October Mark

OTTAWA, Nov. 17—(CP)—With reduced yields reported in Quebec, Ontario and Saskatchewan, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics' second estimate of the Canadian potato crop was placed at 35,320,000 hundredweight units, a reduction of 3,555,000 hundredweight from the first estimate made in October.

With little change expected in Ontario provinces, the potato production in 1939 now is estimated at slightly less than the 1938 production of 35,938,000 cwt.

A small upward revision has been made in the estimate of the 1939 production of turnips and man-gos which now is placed at 33,430,000 cwt., approximately the same as 1938.

Second estimate of the sugar beet yield in Ontario has been reduced and production now is expected to be 64,000 tons, a reduction of 14,000 tons from the first estimate.

Lull Continues On West Front

PARIS, Nov. 17—(AP)—The lull continued on the western front today while the allied supreme war council met in England to coordinate economic and military measures against Germany.

The night French communiqué told merely of "local activity of units in contact and artillery." The morning report said the entire front passed a quiet night.

On the home front finance minister Paul Reynaud outlined before the finance committee of the chamber of deputies a 1940 civil budget of 10,000,000,000 francs (about \$1,934,900,000) which he asserted receipts would balance.

France will have an extraordinary budget which adds 40 per cent to the total ordinary budget on civil and military needs. This ordinary budget has been set provisionally at 949,000,000 francs.

New decrees raised the general salary tax from two per cent to five per cent and in addition to the 18 and 49 who have not been mobilized will have to pay a 15-per cent "war chest" tax effective Jan. 1.

Finance Minister Ralston To Run In Prince

OTTAWA, Nov. 17—(CP)—Finance Minister Ralston has accepted an offer from the Prince County Liberal Association to nominate him as Government candidate in the Federal By-Election next Jan. 8. It was announced tonight from the Prime Minister's office.

The by-election in the Prince Edward Island riding was necessitated by the death of A. E. MacLean, former Liberal member.

Mr. Ralston today received a telegram from B. Graham Rogers, president of the east Prince Liberal Association, and James E. Wells, president of the west Prince Liberal Association, advising him they were authorized by a joint meeting of the executives of the two Associations to invite him to accept the nomination.

The announcement said that Col. Ralston "has replied expressing his deep appreciation of the honor implied in the invitation and stating that he would have very much pleasure in accepting if the convention should see fit to tender the nomination to him."

It is understood that the convention will be called probably sometime in the early part of December.

Col. Ralston, Minister of National Defence in the previous Liberal Government, was appointed Finance Minister last August after Hon. Charles Dunning resigned the portfolio due to ill health, but he has no seat in the Commons.

During the special war session last September, Col. Ralston was not present on the floor of the House during debates because he was not a member of Parliament. He prepared the budget speech but it was read to the Commons by Revenue Minister Bailey, acting for the Finance Minister.

If Col. Ralston is elected for Prince, he will give Cabinet representation to that Province which has not been represented since Mr. Dunning resigned his Cabinet post.

CANADA WORKS DAY AND NIGHT ON WAR EFFORT

Ground Work Near Completion Of Unprecedented Activity In Dominion.

OTTAWA, Nov. 17—Events in Ottawa are moving rapidly toward the point when at least a partial picture of the vast organization in Canada for the Empire's war effort may be given.

Behind closed doors in Government buildings and rented offices throughout the capital the cream of the Empire's technicians and experts have been working night and day on plans which, unless peace can be made, will bring unprecedented industrial and training activity to the Dominion.

Within two weeks, and probably earlier it was learned today, simultaneous announcements are expected to be made in London and Ottawa on the huge Empire air training scheme which will send thousands of planes into the Canadian sky and dot the Dominion from coast to coast with army flying fields.

Possibly sooner a glimpse will be given of the amount and allocation of the purchasing and construction contracts being handled by the war supply board for both the United Kingdom and Canada.

Which makes Minister Ralston's scheduled broadcast address next Friday night may reveal to some extent the manner in which the \$100,000,000 voted for war at the September emergency session of Parliament is being spent.

The Finance Minister may also give some information on the additional expenditures Canada will be called upon to make as her share in the war.

On the other side of the ledger the Minister may indicate what amounts will be spent in Canada by the British Government for supplies and by Great Britain, in cooperation with Australia and Canada, on the new Empire training scheme now being developed.

Scotch Lassie Thrilled At Air Prospects

TORONTO, Nov. 17—(CP)—As thrilled as though she were going to her first party, 17-year-old Margaret Murray, Glasgow schoolgirl, has left Toronto for Scotland to join the civil air guard. She was visiting here when war broke out.

Miss Murray said she understands the air guard is a unit of women pilots being trained to participate in actual aerial combat. She said she is not afraid to fight the enemy and is "one of those people who have no fear at all."

Five feet, six inches of health and good humor, Miss Murray said she "loved" shooting and had hunted game in Scotland. She was "lucky" to get in the guard because there is a waiting list of more than 800.

Miss Murray said the national air guard is a hard outfit to get in but which accepted the applicant gets a "very snazzy" white uniform. She applied last March, against the wishes of her father, a Glasgow surgeon, and did not learn her application was accepted until this week.

Borden Citizen Passes Away

There passed away at his home in Borden on Friday Mr. William J. Carruthers, a prominent resident of that place. Mr. Carruthers had been ill for some time and was brought home a short time ago from the Prince County Hospital. He was 73 years of age and a most highly esteemed citizen. He leaves to mourn his wife, two sons at home, Arthur and James, four daughters, Mrs. Edward McQuarrie, Augustine Cove; Aetha, a nurse in Newbrank, N. B.; Mrs. Arnett Simpson, Belmont, Lot 16; Mrs. Herbert Matthews, Alberton; two brothers, Major Carruthers, Augustine Cove; Thomas D. Carruthers, Summerside and one sister Mrs. William Campbell, Cape Traverse. The funeral will take place on Monday at two o'clock from his late residence at Borden.
