The cargo of the City of London from Orwell and Belfast yesterday morning included 60 bags potatoes, 30 cases eggs, 10 horses and other small freight. She also had 45 passengers.

As the Sydney train was two hours late yesterday the Princess did not connect as she usually does. The Princess reached this port at ten minutes to eight and the express at 10.45.

The members of the School of Artillery last night presented M. W. Wilson who leaves shortly for another branch of the Royal Bank with an address accompanied by a beautifully finished pocket book.

TENDERS for furnishing the S. S. Restigouche with supplies the ensuing season at this port have been awarded to Saunders & Newson for meat; R. H. Macdigan, groceries, and Haddlessey & Trainor, fish.

J. C. SIMMS, for the past nine months in charge of the Dominion Packing Company's branch at Sydney left in the city and has accepted the management for Davis & Fraser here. Mr. Simms will return to the Island within a few weeks. Frank Wiley succeeds to Mr. Simms position in Sydney.

The Dominion Fisheries service steamer Ostrea has been launched at the foot of Great George Street after undergoing thorough painting and repairs by Bruce Stewart & Co.

The Electra arrived last night at half past ten with two passengers and a cargo which included 125 cases of eggs, 215 packages of lobsters, 10 bbls tallow, 30 pkgs dry freight and 20 packages household goods of Mrs Joseph McNeill, Montague who is removing to Charlottetown.

The argument on the return of a rule nisi for non suit or new trial in the case of Welsh vs Guard began last Thursday was finished last evening and judgment reserved in the Supreme Court, Haszard, K. C. and Stewart, K. C. for the plaintiff, Morson, K. C. and McLean, K. C., for the defendant.

The case against the Mooney brothers of Peake's Station for assault on Daniel G. Grant of the same place comes up at Georgetown today. The case will be tried before Stipendiary Blanchard, Acting Attorney General Palmer will represent the Crown and J. A. Mathieson the defendants. There are about 30 witnesses.

W. B. ROBERTSON, Superintendent of St. James Sabbath School and David Small Elder and teacher of the congregation and Sabbath School respectively were waited on by a committee representing the teachers and presented with in address expressing the deep regret at their resignation and appreciation at the faithful work they had done among the young.

The death took place yesterday at his home in this city of John McGulrk for a long time a well-known resident of Charlottetown. The deceased was sixty-one years of age and till recently was a familiar personage on the streets where his giant form always made him a prominent figure. There are left to mourn a widow, two daughters and five sons to whom The Guardian extends its sympathy.

ON April the 19th inst there passed away the beloved wife of Ora Hays, Montague Bridge, after a short and painful illness of two weeks, at the early age of twenty-seven years. Deceased was a daughter of Archibald McQueen, Clyde Station and will be greatly missed by her many friends with whom she was a general favorite. She leaves to mourn a father and mother, husband, one child, a brother and five sisters. Her remains were entered in Hartsville cemetery.

HON. Benjamin Rogers, of Alberton, provincial secretary and treasurer and commissioner of agriculture of P. E. Island, is freely spoken of as the next lieutenant-governor of that province. Mr. Rogers is a very prominent Liberal and has represented his constituency in the legislature for about 20 years. He was for one term just previous its abolition, president of the legislative council and has been a member of the local government for several years. The lieutenant-governor's term will expire next month—St John Telegraph.

YESTERDAY Reginald H. Sterns, son of J. G. Sterns, Souris, and proprietor of Sterns' Livery Stables, completed the purchase of the Hotel Davies from the provisional directors appointed the previous night. It is understood that the sum paid was \$20,500. Mr. Sterns intends thoroughly renovating the hotel, placing in it new furniture where necessary and conducting it in first class shape. A gentleman from Halifax will be associated in the management and the hotel will be opened for business about June 1st.

DURING the past few days the steamer Elio has been undergoing repairs which were done by Kimble Coffin and painted by Charles Rowe. She has also been thoroughly inspected by Messrs. Olive and Dalton and pronounced in first-class condition. The cabins have been put in first-class order and she is now in better condition than ever before for pleasure trips as well as for the regular ferry service to Rocky Point. The time table for May published on Page 8 will go into effect tomorrow and the running on the regular summer time table will be begun June 1st. The popular master, Captain Wisser and the Commissioner of Public Works are to be congratulated upon the excellent condition of the boat.
