SEARCH FOR GOLDEN CITIES

For 77 days the band of horsemen made their way across the plains. To help out the food supply they killed buffaloes. The Spaniards noticed "little animals like squirrels," which ran along the ground and lived in holes. These were probably chipmunks, though they may have been "prairie dogs."

No one knows just what route was taken by Coronado and his horsemen, but it seems certain that they passed through a great deal of the state of Kansas. Perhaps they entered the southern part of Nebraska.

Quivira was not a grand city at all. As the Feys Indians had said, it contained no large houses of stone. The huts were small, with straw roofs. The people of the village were in a half-savage state. Their clothes were made from the hides of animals; their tools and weapons were formed of wood, stone and bone.

As to "riches," there were none to be found. One chief wore a small plate of copper around his neck, and he was probably the richest man in the place. You can imagine how downcast the Spaniards were after their long journey across the plains, their dreams of gold had burst like bubbles. Mounting their horses, they began their weary return to the southwest.

"No," replied the Indian hunters. "There is no great city built of stone on these plains. The only villages are those formed of earth lodges, or of teepees (tents)."

By further questions the Spaniards learned that the chief village was called Quivira, and was a long march to the northeast. Afraid to trust all his men here with such a small supply of food, Coronado decided to send most of his army back to the land of Cibola. With 30 men on horseback, he forged ahead to find Quivira and discover
