ECUMENICAL CONGRESS AT MOSCOW

MOSCOW—The bells of Moscow's 1,600 churches have been ringing continually since dawn on this, the festival of the assumption, in honor of the opening day of the Ecumenical Congress of the Orthodox church—the first congress held for more than two centuries of ecclesiastical officialism, imposed for political motives by Peter the Great. Ever since the revolution of 1905 all ardent believers of the church have been desiring a revival of the medieval practice of holding these periodical congresses, which they consider the only sure means of rescuing the church from its enslavement to the state, of cleansing its dogmas and ritual and inspiring its formalism with living faith and zeal for social, patriotic service. In this fervent spirit today all of Moscow, and thousands of pious pilgrims from elsewhere are congregated in the city, chiefly in and around the historic Kremlin, to witness the imposing inaugural ceremonies.

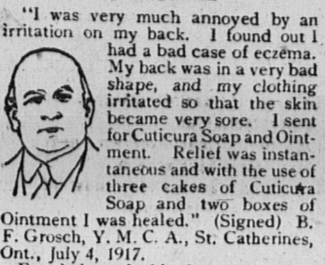
Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

NO PREMIER POSSIBLE EXCEPT SIR ROBERT

Conservative Party in Caucus Declares Sir Robert Borden Continuance as Head of Government is Indispensable to the Nation Proposals of Western Liberals Unanimously Rejected.

OTTAWA—Declaring that the continuance of Sir Robert Borden in the office of Prime Minister of Canada is indispensable to the nation, especially at such a time as at the present, the caucus of Conservative members of the Senate and House of Commons Wednesday, dismissed the amazing proposal of Premier A. L. Sifton, Hon. J. A. Calder, and the other Western Liberals associated with them in the recent negotiations that there should be a change in leadership as a condition of their entry into a union Government. The caucus expressed approval of Sir Robert's efforts to bring about a union of the two parties in the Dominion in support of a natural war Government.

Indeed, it gave him a free hand to proceed with the reconstruction of his Cabinet. The members, however, could not acquiesce in a proposition which involved his retirement from his place as leader of the Government and the party. The caucus was, it is stated, remarkable for the depth of devotion shown by its members to their chief. It came to a close with the unanimous adoption of the following resolution:

Pledge Support to Sir Robert

"We, the supporters of Sir Robert Borden's Government in the Parliament of Canada, record our emphatic approval of that Government's policy and achievements during these three years of war.

"We endorse the earnest and patient effort of the Prime Minister to bring about a union of all the war forces of Canada and to give to the Dominion in these days of ever increasing stress, suffering and peril, the advantage of an Administration which would typify that union and resolution of our people to see this peak to the world the unswerving war through to victory.

"For the purpose of such union we are, one and all, prepared to make any personal or party sacrifice that the occasion may demand. "We record unanimously our profound admiration of the great work and splendid leadership of Sir Robert Borden. We sincerely believe that to no other man can discharge with like capacity the tremendous task of the Prime Minister during this crisis, and that now, of all times, his continuance in the Premiership is indispensable to the nation, and to his leadership we pledge our unalterable support."

Premier's Statement

When the caucus had assembled Sir Robert Borden reviewed his negotiations for the formation of a union Government and emphasized its earnestness of purpose in those endeavors. He had proposed to Sir Wilfrid Laurier a coalition Government with an equal division of portfolios, with the exception of the Premiership, between the parties. When that offer was rejected, the Prime Minister continued, he had made it known that the same terms were open for acceptance by that section of the Liberal party which supported compulsory military service, and which was prepared to sustain all efforts for the winning of the war. Negotiations had subsequently taken place with prominent Eastern Liberals and also with Liberals from the West. More recently he had had an interview with four gentlemen from Western Canada, Premier A. L. Sifton, of Alberta; Hon. J. A. Calder, of Saskatchewan; T. A. Crerar, president of the Grain Growers' Grain Company, and President Woods, of the United Farmers of Alberta. The whole situation was fully and frankly discussed with these gentlemen, and no divergence of opinion, on questions of policy or administration, had arisen. They had returned to Winnipeg, arriving there on Thursday last, and conferred with their friends. Following their conference three of them and another prominent Liberal had despatched a message to the Prime Minister. In that message they declared that they favored the formation of a national Government with a war council of six members, of whom Sir Robert should be one. They stated, however, that they thought a change of leadership essential. They, therefore, named four gentlemen, any one of whom would be acceptable to them as leader of a national war Government. Sir George Foster was the first name mentioned, and, therefore Sir Robert brought it before the caucus. The Prime Minister added that the seniors of the message were all willing to join a

Government led by Sir George, and anticipated that they would be associated with strong colleagues from Eastern Canada.

No Personal Hostility

Sir Robert Borden expressed his conviction that the message of the Western Liberals was not inspired by any antagonism to himself, and that the men who had sent it were personally friendly to him and perfectly sincere. The question of forming a union Government based upon the support of all elements in the population prepared to join in an earnest effort to win the war was, Sir Robert declared, above all personal or party considerations. Any question as to the personal status or political fortunes of any individual was utterly insignificant. The overmastering purpose, the Prime Minister asserted, should be to support the gallant men at the front, to emulate their devotion and self-sacrifice and to win the war. Feeling as he did on that subject, Sir Robert Borden expressed his willingness to retire from the Government altogether, or to serve under Sir George Foster if the latter would undertake the formation of a Government, which result would be to unite all elements of the population. Sir Robert closed with a warm tribute to Sir George Foster's splendid ability, wide experience and personal qualities.
