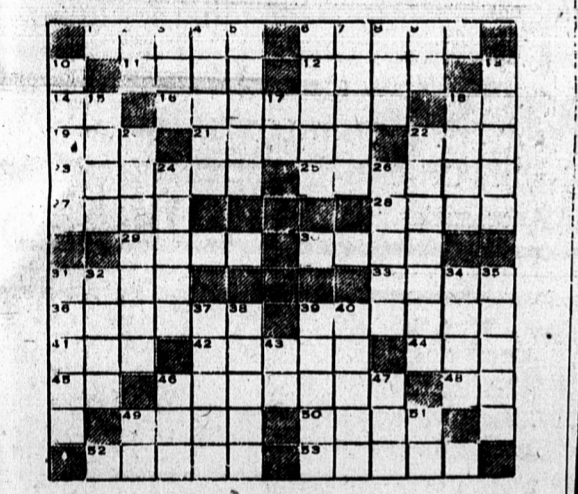

Year Of 13 Months

LONDON, June 4.—The proposal to divide the year into thirteen months, which is stated, the British railway companies have approved. It is one of three schemes on which the League of Nations has been for some time gathering the opinions of the religious authorities and of commercial and business interests. This is the "radical" reform of the calendar; the other two being known as the "simple" and the "partial" reform, the simple equalizing the months and quarters, but retaining the week intact, and establishing a weekly satisfactory concordance between the days of the week and the dates of the month; and the partial leaving one day or two days each year outside the week, according to whether it is an ordinary year or Leap Year. The radical reform scheme divides the year into thirteen months of twenty-eight days, or four weeks each, making a total of fifty-two weeks, or 364 days, to which are added one or two blank days. The permanent extra day might be, it is suggested, New Year's Day, preceding January 1, and the Leap Year day might precede July 1, both being counted as outside the week. By this system a calendar of any year would be reduced to a table which could be applied indifferently to every month, and would be similar to the following: Sunday ..... 1 8 15 22 Monday ..... 2 9 16 23 Tuesday ..... 3 10 17 24 Wednesday ..... 4 11 18 25 Thursday ..... 5 12 19 26 Friday ..... 6 13 20 27
