HALIFAX, March 18. (CP)—The R.C.A.F. said here tonight search for the 26-ton motor vessel MacMariner, reported missing off the west coast of Newfoundland, will begin early tomorrow.

MacMariner carries a crew of eight. The Air Force said the two-masted vessel last was reported along the 60-mile stretch between Cape Ray and Cape St. George.

R.C.M.P. at Sydney, N.S., said heavy flocks were reported in the Cape Ray-Cape St. George area yesterday. Extent of the ice field was not immediately known.

MacMariner's port of registry was not given nor was her destination known.
