The P. R. A. held their second spoon shoot on Saturday afternoon at the Rifle Range with 21 rifle-men taking part and getting in some real competitive practice for the annual prize meet which is scarcely two weeks away. Although a brisk 5 o'clock wind was blowing all day the scoring was high and some of the crack shots are rapidly getting settled down for the season, others are still having trouble with stubborn rifles. In the Class "A" Shoot, Sgt. A. J. McCabe won the spoon with a "Century" scoring 100 points over the 200, 500 and 600 yards, including a perfect score at the 500. This puts Sgt. McCabe in the Century Club of the P. E. I. P. R. A., the second to make it this year, Capt. A. W. Allan having made the grade with a 102 just previous to the Inter-Maritime Match. In Class "B" J. S. McDonald won the spoon with 97 points, a remarkable performance when it is considered that this is his first attempt with the .303.

One of the rules of the shoots is that a person winning a spoon in any class must thereafter shoot in the next higher class, this gives a chance to all. The next shoot will be held next Saturday commencing at 2 o'clock sharp, and the Committee request competitors to be ready to shoot at the 200 not later than 2:30 p.m. The following are the scores:—

The Georgetown Races

Pro-... smiled at Georgetown and vicinity on July 8th. Rain fell over all the Province except within a ten mile radius from Georgetown. Two thousand fans saw the keenest and closest kind of racing—everything going just like clockwork—no hard feeling or recriminations—the vanquished taking their medicine like good little men. The fans were agreeably surprised to see such a large attendance and such good racing. The secretary, E. B. McLaren, has labored for two or three years under adverse circumstances, till at last "fortune on him smiled" and he succeeded in establishing Georgetown as a bona fide racing emporium. Track records were smashed and again the "dope" was upset—at least in two classes—Chestnut Dillon, (Chester Pratt) in the 2:15 trot and The Willys, (Chas. Reardon), in the 2:30 Trot and Pace. Chestnut Dillon is a recent importation from the Mainland and was rather an unknown quantity till July 8th. The Willys is the Kensington green pacer, (full brother of Jacquelin-2:10) which seems to have the potentialities of his wonderful pacing sister. In the 2:13 Pace, Lindy, (the lion hearted) was unbeatable—although the great little pacer Billy Cope challenged him hard in each heat. Billy is making it tougher for Lindy every race.

the other is in the police office.

Councillor Reardon could not see how the City could be properly policed with the number of men on the force. Councillor Foster thought that two extra men might well be put on the force for the summer at least.

Councillor Holman stated that if citizens compared the police reports of the last four years with those of years preceding they would note a vast improvement in efficiency. He stated that the Chief would be very glad to have an extra man on the force permanently.

The Committee also had thought it would be well to have another officer. Years ago there had been double the police force there was at present.

Councillor Dougan stated that five months ago Councillor Holman had stated that there would be no additions or no promotions in the police force. A new man had since been taken on and now the Councillor wished to hire another.

Councillor Holman stated that a vacancy had been filled. His Worship stated that it was for the Council to decide whether or not the police force was adequate.

Councillor Reardon believed that a man should be added to each shift.

Councillor McDougall congratulated Councillor Holman on the excellent way in which the Police Department had been conducted. He believed that the force should be enlarged.

Councillor Reardon believed two extra men should be added for a few months, and possibly be continued. Councillor Kennedy concurred in the idea.

His worship instructed the city collector to find out all unlicensed agents who are going from door to door selling their wares. The police were also instructed to do likewise.

Regarding the contract with the Light Company, Councillor Holman suggested that the Light Committee be instructed to hold a meeting with the president of the company as soon as possible.

In accordance with a suggestion of His Worship a resolution was brought in to place at the disposal of the Government the plant and equipment of the City in order to alleviate unemployment.

A resolution for the laying of plank sidewalks on sections of Birchwood and Gerald Streets was allowed to stand over in order that the chairman of Finance might have an opportunity of considering the matter.

A resolution was passed authorizing the City Surveyor to make repairs on the platform at Fort Edward. Another resolution permitted the Legion Band to give four band concerts on the Square and the League of the Cross Band two concerts, at the rate of \$50 a concert. Exemption to taxation was granted to the firm of Wm. Landrigan and Co., for a period of five years.

There was considerable discussion on a resolution introduced to authorize the Police Committee to appoint two temporary police officers.

Councillor Dougan thought that the decision of the committee should be subject to the approval of the Council. Councillors Holman and Foster believed that the decision of the committee should be final in making a temporary appointment.

Permanent Officer

Chief of Police Birtwistle following a discussion as to policy of temporary or permanent appointment, suggested that one permanent officer be appointed.

The matter was allowed to stand over till a meeting on Thursday evening.

Councillor Foster stated that some truckmen had been charging citizens 25 cents as fee for dumping refuse at the City dump, while the fee was only 10 cents.

Tenders for Sand

Councillor Dougan again brought up the matter of calling tenders for sand and gravel. There was some discussion as to the relative merits of the Souris sand and that procured at Holland Cove and vicinity. It was stated by the City Clerk in reply to questions, that tenders had never before been called for sand or gravel.

It was decided to call for tenders for sand to be opened in one week, samples of sand to be submitted with tenders.

Facts like the above—and paying thirty seven dollars for a telegram at Tolovana and forty dollars for the use of a gasoline launch at Juncieu exemplify his never-give-up spirit.

Railway Team Lose To Rovers In Great Game

C. N. R. C's Force Cagey North Enders All The Way To Take 3 to 2 Win.

Battling every inch of the way with victory for either team hanging by a thin hair, Rovers and C. N. R. C's gave the fans the best exhibition of ball they've seen this season—barring none.

Each and every inning was featured with good batting, fielding bordering on the sensational and base running that had the fans on the edges of their seats. The hurling also, by Mahoney of the Recreation Club and Carson of the Rovers left little to be desired. Both boys although hit often, waged one of the nicest duels ever seen on the Abegweit diamond. Noticeable last evening was the steadiness with which each team played. Not for one moment did they let up, and not for a moment was there any semblance of a bad break. Only on one or two occasions were the pitchers in a bad hole, and each time they mounded themselves out magnificently—of course backed up by an air-tight outfield and a hard-working and cagey infield. The Rovers won the tilt 3 to 2.

Some of the catches in the outfield were worth gazing a long way to witness. For instance, Murley's circus stab of Squarebriggs' long drive into centre field in the third inning. It looked for a moment as if the ball was going to get away from him, but his last second effort brought rounds of applause from the stands. Then again, diminutive Jimmy Donovan jumped into the picture with another dandy pick, when he one-handed a hard drive off the bat of Jackie Kane in the sixth for the third out. There were two on at the time. Jimmy Duffy also nailed a beauty on a running catch to stop what looked like a safe drive. Space and time will not permit the enumerating of the dozen or more brilliant plays, suffice to state that baseball of last night's calibre, if continued, would soon restore the game to its former prestige in this city.

It was anybody's tilt last night and the Rovers were certainly a proud ball club to have won from such a smooth working aggregation as the Railway team.
