LA TUQUE.

The railroad towns of rapid growth are not in the West alone. La Tuque, on the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, 127 miles from Quebec, is a wonderful example of this. Two years ago there was not a house there. Today, there is a handsome, well laid out, well built town with two churches, a school, a bank, a sulphite pulp mill, two saw mills, some very fine stores and a resident population of about 2,000. The Quebec Bank opened a branch there a few weeks ago, and in a very few days had \$60,000 on deposit. La Tuque is a divisional point on the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway and will have the shops for that division. It is also the terminus of the Tuque branch of the Lake St. John division of the Canadian Northern Railway, and the head of navigation of the river St. Maurice, which is navigable for steamers for seventy miles from La Tuque southward to Grand Piles.

But the principal advantage of La Tuque is its water power. The river St. Maurice; at this point, a magnificent stream half a mile wide, falls ninety feet, making available for industries no less than ninety thousand horse-power. This is only partially developed, but already the Messrs.

The latest news, first of all.

The mail train arrived in this city Saturday night at ten o'clock.

Miss Margaret Martin, who has been visiting her home in this city returns to the Royal Victoria Hospital, Montreal, this morning.

Miss Kathleen Dockendorff of the Singer Sewing Machine Co. City, is undergoing treatment at the P. E. I. Hospital and is doing nicely after an operation for tubercular trouble.

The Northumberland arrived in this port yesterday from Summerside and will go on her usual route this morning. The Empress resumes the Point du Chene route this morning. The Minto will lay up for the present at the Marine Wharf.

At the Police Court in this city yesterday the assault and robbery case of O'Neal and the Power and Binns men was concluded without any evidence being given by the defence, who claim they will produce witnesses later to prove their innocence. His Honor committed the defendants for trial at the session of the Supreme Court which meets on June 28th in this city. Arthur O'Neal, the prosecutor, was required to file bonds for \$250 for his appearance as a witness at that trial. A. A. McLean, K. C., appeared for the prisoners. O'Neal's evidence showed that he and several of his friends including Bill Green, a big powerful seaman, Hen and King all colored, went up to the Kewnesses. They remained there till ten o'clock. O'Neal and Green left together on the way back to the wharves. When they came to King Street, they were accosted by Power and Binns. The former was standing in a door way and Binns was alongside of him. Power said, "Hello, boys what's doing?" Green said, "What do you think can be doing?" O'Neal and Green walked up till they came to Union Street, then they thought they couldn't get through and both decided to turn back. At that time both prisoners were coming down the street. O'Neal said to Green, "That man appears to have one arm." The one-armed man had something which he passed to the other saying "hold that." He then said to Green "You look like a d—n big feeling fellow." Bill replied "ves I am a big feeling man and what a home it is." The one armed man said "I did not mean any harm to you I only thought you had something to drink or wanted it, and you can get it on this street. Green said "did you think we came ashore to treat hobos and hounds." O'Neal and Green went along, towards the schooner Ann J. Trainor and both Power and Binns followed. After a while a third man joined them. O'Neal said to Green "I brought the money to have a game of cards." Power and Binns were waiting behind them. They passed the Victoria Hotel and the Lenox and went to Full's wharf. Power and Binns stepped by the little house where the coal is weighed. O'Neal stayed and heard the schooner for ten minutes and started up the wharf to go to Connolly's to join his own schooner. He was walking along the railway track Past Full's mill, towards the Navigation wharf with both his hands in his pocket until he came to where there were some heaps of coal. "The first thing I knew," said O'Neal, was that I received a severe blow in the middle of my back. I did not go down. I turned round and saw Frank Power in front of me. He caught hold of my coat sleeve. Just then I received a blow from behind on the back of my head that sent me down. That was when the big man held my sleeve just a second before I got the second blow I heard the words "I got it," or "I got them." O'Neal did not remember what took place when he was down. He was stunned, when he came to he found his nose bleeding. He put his hands in his pockets and found his letters, his discharges, and his wallet with the initials "J. A. O." on it, all gone. All his money \$45.65 was taken. He then came up to the telegraph office, and telephoned the police.

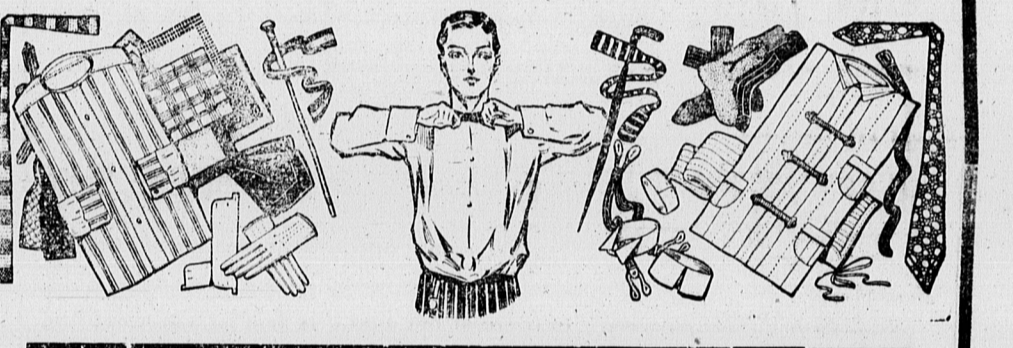
