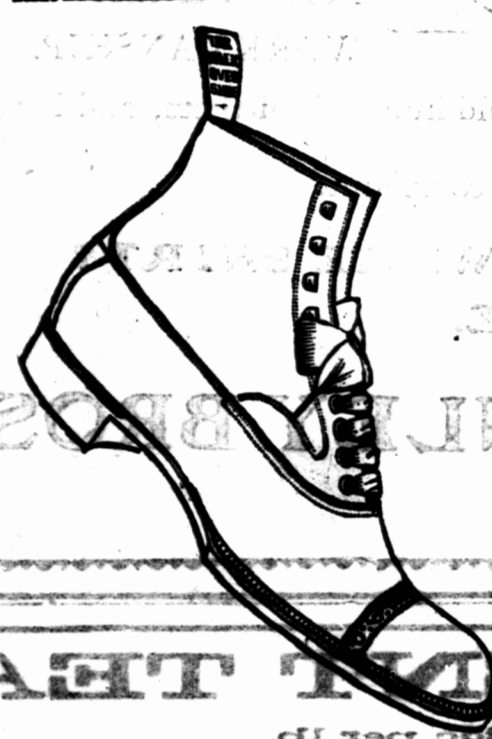

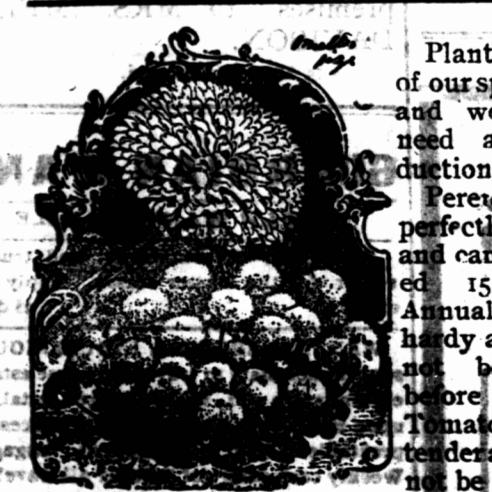

GAY'S PLANTS

Tomatoes are less hardy and should be planted in the open before that time. Perennials, wintered over, such as Daisy, Forget-me-not, Sweet William, Dianthus, at 40c per doz. Hollyhock and Carnation, etc., at 50c per doz. Annuals, Aster, Stock, Phlox, Petunias, Verbenas, Lobelia, Zinnia, Morning Glory, Sweet Peas, Balsams, Candytuft, Canary Creeper, Nasturtium, tall and dwarf single Dahlias, Mignonette, Snap Dragon, etc., etc., at 15c per doz. Vegetable plants—Extra Early Cabbage, Cauliflower, and Celery at 50c per 100. Extra Early Tomato 40c per doz. Late plants for green tomatoes 12c per doz., Cucumber, 12c per doz., Squash, and Pumpkins 15c per doz. Late Cabbage for fall and winter use 12c per 100, Cauliflower 35c per 100, Celery 40c. Whenever possible order to be shipped by freight. By mail 8c per lb. extra must be added. Cash to accompany order. When ordering, mention if early or late vegetable plants required. Take notice that on or after the 10th of June we will be open for business in our market stalls every day (except Sundays). We trust that this new departure will meet with the practical approval and support we always have had on market days. 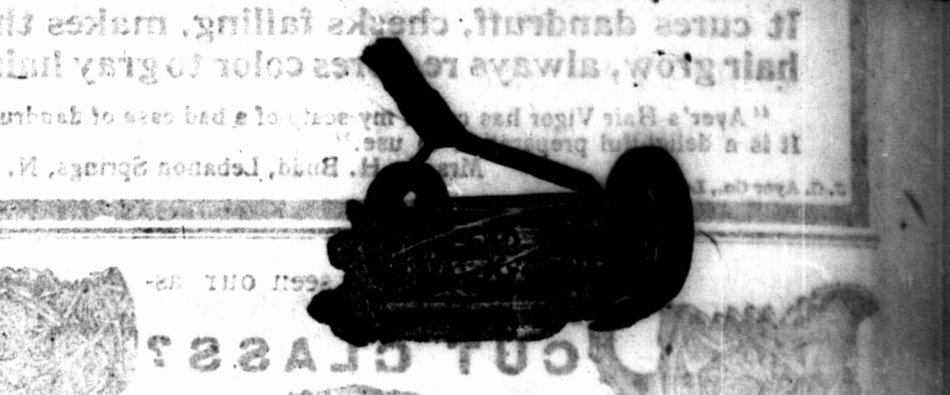
