

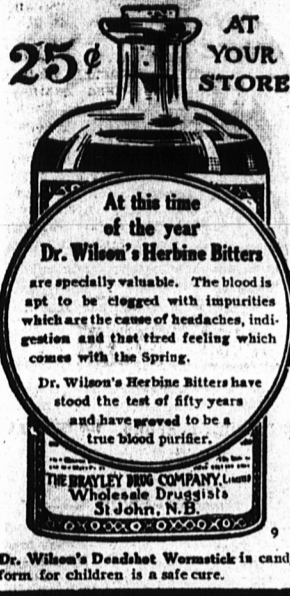

GERMANS TOLD CANADA IS NOW ON LAST LEGS.

LONDON, Feb. 8.—Germany's extraordinary ideas of present Canadian conditions is shown by reports published in the semi-official Cologne Gazette on Jan. 29.

The following is an exact translation made from a copy of the journal now before me:

"Most Government offices in Canada have closed so far as is dispensable. All scientific institutes, particularly the Natural History Survey, are practically at a standstill because no money is available, all the revenues being used for the support of the English war."

Farm Hands From The United States

OTTAWA, Feb. 6.—Hon. Dr. Roche, Minister of the Interior, announced today that a campaign was to be launched in the United States to secure agricultural laborers for Western Canada. Dr. Roche has returned from Chicago, where he has been in conference with the American immigration agents of the Department of Immigration. It was a result of this conference that a special campaign for farm help is to be started. The West has been sadly drained of men who have enlisted for overseas service. As a result, in many districts agricultural help is exceedingly short. In addition, last fall, the weather was very inclement and the West was able to do little fall farming. If the Western farmers are to keep up their campaign of production there will have to be an unusual amount of early spring plowing in Western Canada. This can only be done by securing extra help from the United States.

The American immigration agents of the department all stated that the American rural papers had been filled with stories that there was to be conscription in Canada and that there were heavy taxes on land amounting, some stories said, to \$500 an acre. These stories were denied by Hon. Dr. Roche, who explained the policy of the Canadian Government and the Department of the Interior. The conference was attended also by members from the Prairie Provinces—Hon. C. Norris, Hon. Walter Scott and Hon. Arthur Sifton.

NEW YORK GIRL SOLD AS A WHITE SLAVE

NEW YORK, Feb. 7.—How she was kidnapped, robbed of her clothes and auctioned on the block in a New York White Slave market for \$55, was told by a pretty 18-year-old Marie Klein, daughter of the Rev. Charles Klein of Bethany Reformed Church here following her rescue and capture of "Jimmy Naples" her alleged kidnapper. She had been missing since December 16.

Naples once befriended Miss Klein when hoodlums attacked her on her way home after organ practice at the church, according to Mr. Klein, and visited there often, frequently saying he would "always defend Miss Klein."

The girl's story is that Naples dragged her into a doorway on the afternoon of December 16, showed her a revolver in his coat pocket, and threatened to kill her if she tried to get away, then forced her to take \$400 in jewels and \$35 cash from her parents and driving her to an Italian colony house in Williamsbridge, looked her in a room and took her clothes. Klein said it was at a Christmas ball of the Colonists in Williamsbridge that I was sold," said Miss Klein.

After their daughter disappeared the Kleins say, Naples terrorized them, with threats to cut their hearts out, if they contacted him with her disappearance. The detectives had to lead Naples almost into unconsciousness with clubs before he was captured.

CARDINAL MERCIER ILL.

ROME, February 7.—via Paris—Cardinal Mercier, primate of Belgium, who has been in Rome for more than a fortnight, has been taken suddenly ill with the grippe, which is now epidemic in the city. The news that the cardinal was suffering from the malady having spread throughout Rome, there has been a notable demonstration of sympathy for him from all classes of the population.

THE EXTREME LIMIT OF GERMANY'S CONCESSIONS

BERLIN, Feb. 5.—Information reaching the Associated Press today indicates that under no circumstances will Germany admit that the sinking of the Lusitania was an illegal act.

The new instructions to Ambassador Von Bernstorff, according to this information, contains simply one phrase of the new formation of the proposed note of regret for the sinking of the Lusitania. The suggested sentence is short, consisting of only eight words, and does not contain the word "illegal." It represents the extreme limit of Germany's concessions in the Lusitania case.
