### DE LINQUENCY ON INCREASE COUNCIL TOLD

#### Matter Is Discussed At Regular Monthly Meeting Last Night.

The Summerside Town Council held their regular monthly meeting last night. Mayor J. E. Campbell presiding. The increased delinquency among children was the object of considerable discussion by the Mayor and Councillors. A councillor Wedge, reporting for the police committee, said that Chief White stated that juvenile delinquency is causing considerable trouble. Councillor Wedge said it was a matter of deep concern when children lose respect for the law. He said that Chief White told him the matter of delinquency was practically out of control and that drastic steps must be taken to correct the situation.

### TONQUE WITH ALMOND SAUCE

Soak a pickled tongue in cold water for a few hours, remove and place in kettle with hot water, and simmer slowly for three or four hours, until the meat is tender. Allow tongue to remain in water until cool, then skin, and cut in slices. Boil almonds in butter in a saucepan add 1-3 cup water, shredded almonds. In another pan melt 2 tablespoons butter, add 1-2 cup minced onion, 1 medium onion, 1-2 cup cinnamon, 1-4 teaspoon cloves, salt and pepper. Then add the almonds and cover with the cooked tongue. Cover and simmer for 10 minutes, then serve, accompanied by baked potatoes and Brussels sprouts.

### Kept Afloat

Heretofore the Prime Minister has refused to enter into public controversy with Mr. Heppburn, except in the most polite and diplomatic language which did not acknowledge or indicate any acceptance of strong differences of opinion between them.

### Back In Ottawa

Back in Ottawa today both Mr. Rogers and Mr. Howe refused to amplify the charges they made at Port Arthur. They indicated they would have nothing more to say at present, when asked for details of the alleged efforts of Mr. Heppburn and Mr. Duplessis to bring about retirement of the Prime Minister.

### RECORD ATTENDANCE

TORONTO, Dec. 11.—(CP)—A record attendance for a Canadian Rugby Union final was set when 18,486 fans paid to watch Toronto Argonauts defeat Winnipeg Blue Bombers 30-7 for the National Championship in Varsity Stadium Saturday. Altogether about 19,000 were jammed into the stadium.

## Weekly Livestock Market Report

### SUMMARY

There was a general all around good market for all classes of live stock during this week. A sharper tone and more active trading featured the cattle market and prices as a rule were 15c to 25c higher than a week ago. Calves likewise sold stronger making gains of as much as 25c to 50c. The market for hogs was generally what unsettled but the closing tone at most markets was firm, although Toronto buyers were seeking lower prices for the week-end. Lamb prices moved to higher ground in Winnipeg and Toronto advancing 50c, and other market centres reporting good gains. Cattle continued to move across the line to the United States markets with fairly good numbers, some 3,400 head being exported during the past week. Stocker and feeder calves proved sufficiently broad to maintain firm rates, but the holiday season is usually associated with a resting market and a decrease in demand stock. Shippers, therefore, would exercise good judgment by holding light finished cattle off the market as the principal inquiry for the immediate future is likely to centre around material adaptable for the Christmas trade.

### Added Strength to Cattle Market

A liberal run of cattle was well taken care of at Toronto, where prices advanced 15c or so on weighty steers and fed calves while a few choice steers advanced 25c to 50c. The market for hogs was generally what unsettled but the closing tone at most markets was firm, although Toronto buyers were seeking lower prices for the week-end. Lamb prices moved to higher ground in Winnipeg and Toronto advancing 50c, and other market centres reporting good gains. Cattle continued to move across the line to the United States markets with fairly good numbers, some 3,400 head being exported during the past week. Stocker and feeder calves proved sufficiently broad to maintain firm rates, but the holiday season is usually associated with a resting market and a decrease in demand stock. Shippers, therefore, would exercise good judgment by holding light finished cattle off the market as the principal inquiry for the immediate future is likely to centre around material adaptable for the Christmas trade.

### CALF MARKETS

TORONTO calves strong and 50c higher in spots on medium to good. Choice veals were \$10 to \$10.50, some tops \$11. Heavy Westerns \$8 to \$9 and grassers mostly \$4.50 with few \$4.75.

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### Record Asbestos Production

OTTAWA, Dec. 12.—Asbestos production in Canada during 1937 was the greatest ever recorded, amounting to 410,628 short tons valued at \$14,505,791 compared with 301,287 short tons worth \$9,958,183 in the previous year. Asbestos production came almost entirely from the Eastern Townships in the Province of Quebec, although an interesting feature of the industry in 1937 was the recording of a relatively small production of asbestos in northern Ontario, the first commercial output of the mineral to be credited to that province in several years.
