Sermon On True And False Christs

Taking for his text the language of Matt. 24: 24, "There shall arise false Christs," Evangelist F. W. Johnston lectured last night in the Brighton Club Rooms on the "False Christs of the Twentieth Century." He emphasized the fact that since there is salvation only in the true Christ of the scriptures it therefore becomes essential to know of a surety as to whether we are really following the true Christ. He said he was not so much concerned about the individuals who would undoubtedly arise declaring themselves to be Christ; for as he said we could easily dispose of them. The thing that concerned him the most was the false conceptions of Christ that are preached from many modern pulpits. He said the true Christ of the scriptures is declared to be the divine Son of God, Romans 1:4. He is also said to be the Creator, Col. 1:14, 16. This same Son of God, he said, was afterward clothed with humanity and born as a babe in Bethlehem of Judea, John 1:14, and that he was born in sinful flesh just like his brethren. Heb. 2:16, 17, 2 Cor. 5:21, although he himself never committed sin, 1 Peter 2:22. Instead of committing sins, he said that Christ overcame sin in the flesh and became perfect through suffering, Heb. 2:10, and who because of his suffering on the cross, justifies sinners and sanctifies Christians and gives them grace to obey the commandments of the word of God.

But this, he said, is not the Christ that is believed in by many professors of Christianity, said Mr. Johnston. Many say Christ was born in human flesh and very different from the rest of mankind. But this could not be, said the evangelist; for if Christ were born in sinful flesh he could not have been tempted in all points like as we are, and the scriptures say that he was, Heb. 4:15. Thus the preaching that Christ came in sinful flesh is not the Christ of the Bible and therefore is a false Christ.

Then as the evangelist said there is another conception of Christ that is absolutely false and that is that Christ was only a good man, and not the divine Son of God. But Christ, he said, was the Son of God as well as the son of man. He possessed the dual nature while here in sinful flesh. Then, he said, there are those who say we are saved by imitating Christ and not by his great work of atonement. Many, he said, flatly deny that the blood of Christ cleanses away sin.

This also, he said, was not the Christ of the scriptures; for Christ shed his blood for the sins of all mankind. Then, he said, there are those who teach that when one accepts of Christ he is released from all obligation to keep the ten commandments. This, he said, is not the Christ of the scriptures; for the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ gives to the one who accepts him the power to obey every precept. We can hardly conceive of Christians being released from keeping the commands of the Lord. Love and true fellowship with Christ means more than singing hymns, even going to church and praying and having our name on the church records. It means obedience to all the requirements of the Lord. Christ said, "If ye love me keep my commandments." "Ye are my friends if ye do whatsoever I have commanded you." John 15:14. Many, he said, think that if they believe in Christ they do not have to obey him. This, however, he said, was wrong; for as he read in John 14:12, that whoever believed in Christ would do the works that he did. These works, Mr. Johnston said, were works of obedience. Christ said, "I have kept my Father's commandments and abide in his love." John 15:10. We need therefore to be sure we are following the Christ of the Bible, he said, if we would be saved in the kingdom of heaven and not be among the disappointed ones referred to in Matt. 7:21, 22. He also read from Ezekiel 33:31, 32.

Charge Company With Negligence

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Writer) NEW YORK, Jan. 24.—The United States government today accused the New York and Cuba Mail Steamship Company, owners of the Morro Castle, with criminal negligence in the day the ship began operations in 1930 until she burned Sept. 8, 1934, off Sea Girt, N. J., with the loss of 124 lives. Francis W. H. Adams, prosecutor, summed up the charges of criminal negligence against Captain William F. Warm's, Chief Engineer Ewen S. Abbott, Henry E. Cabaud, executive vice president of the company, and the company itself. He accused the company of failing to provide adequate crews or to see that safety rules were observed.

EDUCATIONAL ADVANCE IS PLANNED

Board of Education of England and Wales Announce New Program.

(By George Hambleton Canadian Press Staff Writer)

LONDON, Jan. 26.—Advance is planned along the whole education front. A circular issued by the Board of Education to local authorities in England and Wales details that part of the government's education program which does not require legislation. Plans cover: More state scholarships to universities. More "special places" (scholarships) in secondary schools. More nursery schools. Increased government grants for elementary school buildings. Cantens where school children, coming from a distance, can obtain satisfactory meals at reasonable cost; and for drying wet clothes and boots. Development of technical, art and adult education. Schemes of physical education. Improvement in school medical services. Scholarships from grant-aided secondary schools to universities now number 300 per year. The number is to be increased to 360. The maximum maintenance grant of \$400 a year payable to holders of state scholarships is to be raised. Examinations for state scholarships will be open to candidates from any secondary school in England and Wales. In the last examinations, there were 5,645 entrants for 300 scholarships. The circular states that the natural place for children under five years of age is the home, but that there are many young children whose mothers, through no fault of their own, are unable to give them at home the care and attention which they need. The board asks all local education authorities to survey the needs of their areas in order that they may provide, where necessary either nursery schools or special accommodation in the infant departments of public elementary schools for children under five. The board urges that simplicity should characterize both the planning and the equipment of the accommodation and its maintenance. The grant which the board of education makes to local education authorities for building or reconstruction is to be increased as from Jan. 1, 1936, from 20 to 50 per cent.

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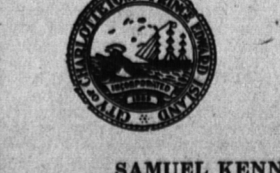
