LARNER CARRIAGE HERE HE WILL RECEIVE IT TO-DAY

TWO RUSSIAN CRUISERS REACHED VLADIVOSTOCK

Viewed and Approved by Hundreds—Story of the Larner Fund—How it Originated—A Commercial Man's Happy Thought—Full List of the Contributors—Cost of the Carriage.

The carriage for William Larner, purchased with subscriptions as from time to time acknowledged in The Guardian, was received yesterday. Prowse Bros. very kindly offered the use of the show window of the vacant store in the new Prowse Block in which to display the carriage, and needless to say it has been viewed by hundreds of citizens. It will remain on exhibition for a few hours this morning after which it will be presented to the young man. The cut here with gives a good idea of the carriage, which is substantially built, and the best and most comfortable obtainable. It requires least possible effort on the part of the rider who operates it with his right hand. It steers very easily with the left hand and runs without difficulty over uneven surfaces or up ordinary grades at a speed equal to a fast walk. Everything about it is simple and strong. The chair itself is of oak, nicely caulked, right shape for the back and body, and fitted with elliptical steel springs. The wheels are fitted with cushioned tires and ball bearings. A loose green corduroy cushion covers the seat, whilst overhead is suspended a sateen canopy for use in hot weather. It is also supplied with an adjustable handle for propulsion by an assistant, if ever necessary.

The ready and hearty response on the part of all contributors has made the obtaining of the money a most pleasing task for the Guardian, and no doubt the gift will be most gratefully received by the young man himself. Several persons offered a second subscription if required. Below will be found a complete list to date. Any others who desire to contribute should do so at once, as the fund will be closed a month or so.

The initiatory step was taken by Harry Patt, traveller for Miller & Rickford, Type Foundry, Toronto. Whilst in this city on a business trip, less than two months ago, he met William Larner on the street and handed him a dollar as a starter for a subscription to a carriage. On the suggestion of Mr. Patterson that some newspaper take the matter up, The Guardian did so. The carriage is of American manufacture, and through Mr. Patterson's efforts, it has been possible to purchase it at a much lower price, duty prepaid by the dealer, than was at first anticipated.

The items expended will be found below, and several of the subscribers long ago suggested that the balance if any, be presented to Mr. Larner. Not only the last five amounts in the list were subscribed on the above understanding, after the arrival of the carriage yesterday.

NEWCASTLE, Pa., Aug. 18—(Special)—Patrolman Frank Skidmore was shot and killed and Patrolman John Atkinson wounded in attempting to arrest Rosewell Waite in the outskirts of Newcastle. Waite escaped.

GROOM STABBED BY HIS BROTHER.

MONCTON, Aug. 18—(Special)—In a fight at a wedding celebration in Harcourt Edward Shirley stabbed his brother James, the groom, in the stomach. The injuries may prove fatal.

SALVATION ARMY CHANGES.

TORONTO, Aug. 18—(Special)—Evangeline Booth has been ordered to be ready to leave Canada.

Other changes in the Army are said to be contemplated which may include the removal of Commaner Booth Tucker from New York to London, to be succeeded at New York by Commissioner Eva Booth, now head of the Army in Canada.

CANADA'S SHIPPING TONNAGE.

OTTAWA, Aug. 18—(Special)—Canada's registered shipping tonnage for last year was 683,147 tons, an increase of 534 tons. P. E. I. has 104 vessels of all classes.

With Every Officer Killed or Wounded—Their Narrow Escape—Two Other Cruisers Still Missing—Japan will Hold the Destroyer Seized at Chefoo—China to Disarm Russian Ships.

WILL HOLD THE DESTROYER.

LONDON, Aug. 18—(Special)—Japan officially declares she will not give up the Russian torpedo destroyer captured at Chefoo.

CHINA WILL COMPLY.

CHEFOO, Aug. 18—(Special)—It is generally believed that China will comply with Japan's demand and see that the Russian ships at Shanghai are disarmed. CRUISERS ARRIVE HOME.

The cruisers Gromoboi and Rossia have reached Vladivostok safely but are badly damaged.

TWO CRUISERS STILL MISSING.

There is absolutely no definite news of the cruisers Pallada and Diana.

GRAND DUKE GOING EAST.

The Grand Duke Cyril will accompany Vice Admiral Rogostvensky the commander of the Baltic fleet to the Far East.

ALL KILLED OR WOUNDED.

VLADIVOSTOK, Aug. 18—(Special)—Every officer on board the Rossia and Gromoboi

was either killed or wounded in the battle CRUISERS' NARROW ESCAPE.

The two vessels only escaped complete destruction because the Japanese cruisers did not follow but remained, fearing that some of the Port Arthur fleet might try to break through the straits of Korea.

[The pitiable plight in which two Russian cruisers returned to their home port with all their officers killed or wounded, shows their narrow escape from total destruction. They will not soon venture forth again. As far as the Port Arthur fleet there are missing ships yet to be accounted for. Those at Stargavi will no doubt be disarmed. The remnant at Port Arthur must be sunk in port or venture out to face a terrible fate. Russia's sea power in the East is now utterly shattered and we must doubt whether the Baltic fleet will ever be sent to take the chances where the eastern fleet has failed so miserably and suffered such irretrievable disaster.]

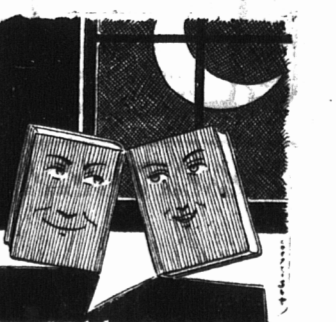
A TRIPLE DROWNING.
