INSPECTED CREAMERIES.

Mr. J. A. Riddick, the Dominion Dairy Commissioner, Hon. W. M. Lea, Commissioner of Agriculture, F. T. Morrow, C. J. Cook and W. J. Reid on Monday last made a trip of inspection among the creameries of the central part of the province. Crapaud was the first place visited, followed by a visit to Tryon, Bodeque and Kensington. These four companies manufacture the largest amount of butter made in the province, and represent one of the best farming districts in the province. Mr. Riddick had not been in the province for ten years, and made very favorable comment on the progress made. It is announced that the intention of the Department of Agriculture to maintain the industry in keeping with the demand of the markets, especially for high class articles. While this has been made in many of the plants in operation, more of them could employ the same means and maintain a higher standard of uniform production, which would meet with ready and universal demand.

The Insulting Patriot

mean throughout the country. It says that they are promoted by Tories and disappointed Liberal office seekers. There must have been many office seekers in the Liberal party if the Patriot is right. But let me tell the Editor of that journal that there are yet many independent Liberals in this country who never did seek any other position than the ones they have on their own farms, who are today convinced that they were thoroughly fooled by the leaders of the party, and party candidates during the last election, men who would not even accept the editorial chair of the Patriot, new paper created a special exorbitant salary of ten or twelve hundred were thrown in. One of their loudest denunciations during the election campaign last year, was the Tory road system and the hosts of Tories who were scattered all over the country at a cost of thousands of dollars, and also the costly engineer who just held it as because he had a friend at court and would be dismissed as soon as they came into office, (a man who is worth more money for his government than any other man in connection with Public Works Department), that only did the combined intelligence of the newly elected government and the supporting members fail to devise a better road system, but they actually added another thirty new officials to the already large and costly staff that they condemned, in such scathing language, so that we have now not only the so-called costly machinery of the Mathieson Government road system but also a supervisor or inspector to look after each two lots. The only defence that the government make now is that the Tories intended to do the same if they had been elected. But the matter would not be so bad if we got results. I am one of those who helped to elect the present government in the hope that they would surely make some attempt at improvement, but this is now what I find. During the first week in July I travelled through the eastern part of the province for several days and ran across five road machines in operation during that dry season, dragging sand, soil and material to make mud up out of the gutter and piling it roughly on the centre of the road. In many places the only way I could get along without being jolted out of the carriage was to run the wheels on one side of the road as far as possible and this being done in both sides in many cases leaving a compost of sods in the middle. I spoke to many along the way and I have yet to meet a man who attempted to justify the sort of road work at this season of the year. One man who was operating a road machine said that he got orders to do this but he did not expect that the road would be as good for the rest of the season as it was before the machine was put onto it. These machines cost about thirty dollars a day each, and they run for about twenty five machines in the province if they were doing the same work in the other parts of the province about \$750.00 a day of the peoples taxes thrown in the mud. There is not a Griot Tory in the country, with the least bit of intelligence who will justify such road work after at least the middle of June, and not even that late and if the new Government, as they claim, did not get their machinery in operation in time, why should such work be done at all out of season? Two men with a horse and cart and a few tools could level off the rough places and fill up a few ruts which would make a much better road at one tenth the cost. Nine tenths of electors of this province, including those who operate the machines, will agree with me in this, when the newly appointed road inspectors, will admit that the cost is money thrown away, so that the lack of judgment is at the seat of authority and we must come to the conclusion that the Commission of Public Works must lack judgment to such an extent as to make him unfit for such a position, particularly at the present time. It is an easy problem solved if a man given a few hundred dollars to do ordinary repairs to our roads, wastes at least three quarters of the amount should those who placed him in his position allow him to (on behalf of the province) borrow \$400,000.00 to be spent in such an incapable manner. He that is faithful (capable) in little shall be faithful in much, has been truly said.

These are only a few of the reasons why some of those who supported the present government are making a noise and calling indignation meetings and, when the Patriot says that we are disappointed Liberal office seekers measuring our support or non support of the present government by a few shabby dollars and cents, we are surely justified and have good reason to return the compliment and say that all the howl, misrepresentation, slander and juggling of figures for twelve months previous to the election was for the purpose of obtaining the crumbs which might fall from the Government table when the party it supported came into power, and now its editorial column very becomingly represents the satisfactory growth that comes from the pleasure of licking them up. When the Patriot editor charges those who chance to differ with him politically with disloyalty and uses such terms as Bashir Bazouk and Bolshevism we may readily come to the conclusion that the definition of loyalty, the last refuge of a scoundrel, is applicable.
