THE POLITICAL CAMPAIGN.

In the olden times it was not infrequent in a Dominion general election for from ten to fifteen seats to be carried by acclamation on nomination day. In the more recent elections the parties have made it a point to contest almost every seat however hopeless the chances of success might be. It was found that the candidate who was allowed his return unopposed almost invariably took an active part in the campaign elsewhere in the week between the nomination and polling, and it was found to be good politics to give each man full employment at home. In the election of 1897 there were nine members returned without opposition. In 1898 the number so returned was reduced to eight, and in the hard contest of 1899 but three were permitted to escape the crucial test of the ballot-box.

In the present contest contest like that of 1899 the opposing forces are making close battle all along the line and again the unopposed elections have been very few. One Conservative member, Mr. Seagram in Waterloo was not opposed, but this was the result of the parties agreeing that one should secure the Commons seat and the other the vacant local seat. Mr. John Charlton's Liberal opponent in South Norfolk appears to have withdrawn in hopelessness of winning, and no doubt in some fear of driving the former Liberal member from his position of independence into one of opposition to the Government. Hon. John Costigan's opponent in Victoria N. B., retired after nomination day for some reason not explained, thus leaving a former strong Irish and French Catholic leader free to work in other counties for his new allies.

So far honors may be said to be easy as the result of the nominations. The interest grows more intense and in some centres is supremely so. This is particularly the case in St. John, where the Minister of Railways and Mr. Foster are having a battle royal. In Halifax and all the cities of the west the fight is also spirited and all the candidates and campaigners are putting forth their utmost efforts. From the country constituencies less is heard, but hundreds of meetings are held every night throughout the Dominion and politics is the engrossing topic everywhere. This excitement and strain will quickly subside when once the ballots are counted and the results are declared on the evening of Wednesday next.

### THE BRITISH OFFICERS PRAISED BY WOLSELEY.

LONDON, Oct. 31.—Field Marshal Lord Wolseley, Commander-in-chief of her Majesty's forces, presided last night at St. James' Hall, on the occasion of the first lecture delivered by Winston Spencer Churchill, lately a war correspondent in South Africa. The hall was crowded, among those being present Mr. Churchill's mother, Mrs. Cornwallis-West, the Duchess of Devonshire and many other prominent members of society. A number of military men were present. The egotism of the lecturer provoked laughter, but otherwise he was uninteresting. He used lantern slides and described the pictures.

Lord Wolseley, in moving a vote of thanks to Mr. Churchill, maintained that the British officer was the finest fighting man in the world and the born leader of men.

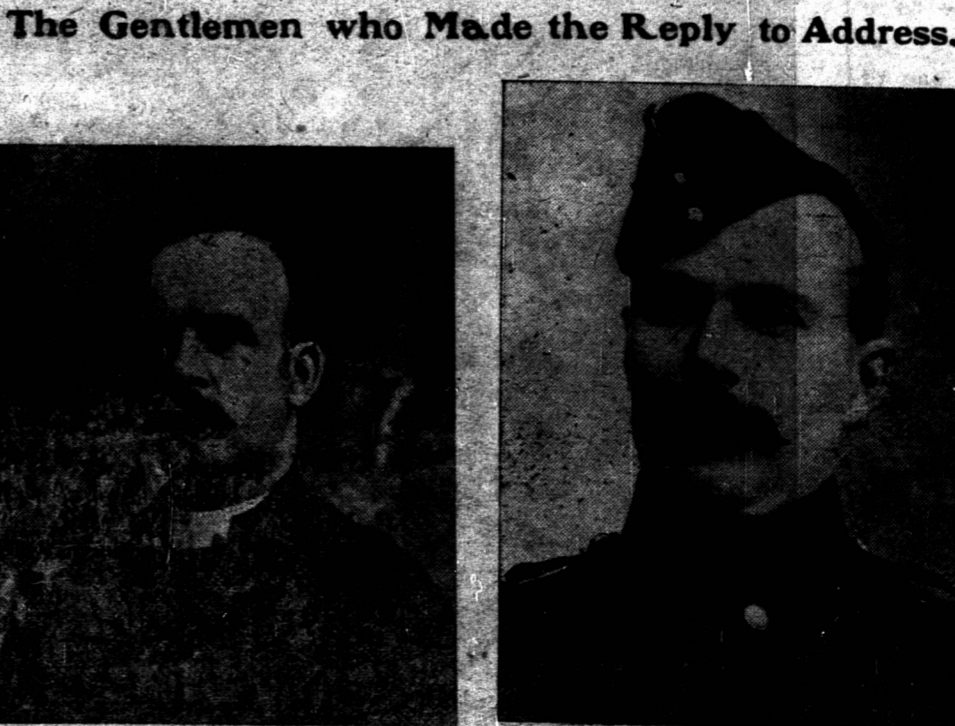
