THE Times had the pleasure of a call yesterday from Father Burke, of Alberton, and Dr. Murphy, of Tignish, P. E. Island, who were on their way home from a trip to Upper Provinces and United States cities. Of course they took in the Pan-American and were delighted with the electrical display, which they say is the feature of the show. As for the rest, like other visitors, they were not particularly impressed. Father Burke is a talented and enthusiastic divine of the Roman Catholic Church, while Dr. Murphy, who is a fine specimen of Island manhood, is quite a prominent politician being president of the Tignish Conservative Association. This was Dr. Murphy's first trip to the Upper Provinces, and the thriftiness of the habitant in Quebec surprised him; in some cases that came under his observation one and sometimes two families living in comfort on a strip of land that in the other provinces would be regarded as a very small farm. Ontario, on the other hand, heralded as a great agricultural district hardly came up to the Doctor's expectations and he thinks P. E. Island will compare quite favorably with such parts of it as he saw. The visitors left yesterday afternoon for the Island.—Moncton Times.

### X-RAY TO BE USED.

Edison sends Apparatus to Be Used in Locating the Bullet.

NEW YORK, Sept 7.—At the telephonic request of Secretary Cortelyou, Thomas A. Edison this evening shipped by the 6.30 o'clock Delaware, Lackawanna & Western train an X ray apparatus to be used to locate the bullet, remaining in President McKinley's body. The train is due in Buffalo at 7 a. m. tomorrow.
