GREGORY STEPHEN HIGGINS

Gregory Stephen Higgins died at his home in Kensington on Sept. 6, 1917 of senile debility. Mr. Higgins was born at Indian River in 1821, hence he had reached the remarkable age of ninety-six. B., Mrs. Angus Nelson, Cordora, Alaska; Mrs. J. J. Gillis, West Somerville, Mass; Mrs. Richard Mullally, Kensington, and Miss Lily at home.

Mr. Higgins will be remembered with fond recollection by all the respected friends who in his life so richly prized his association.

His funeral took place to St. Mary's Cemetery, Indian River, Saturday, Sept. 8, and was a fitting testimony of the high esteem in which he was held by his sincere friends. Rev. Mr. Gillis celebrated a High Mass of Requiem and performed the last sad rites at the grave. Requiescat in pace.

U. S. SENATE HAS EXPELLED TRAITORS.

It is usually a task of the first magnitude to become a Senator of the United States, but even more difficult it is to get rid of a Senator once he has established himself, except at an election. Throughout his own State of Wisconsin, as well as through the country generally, there is a strong, even a passionate, desire to get rid of Senator LaFollette because of his efforts to hamper the war and the belief that he is actuated by a desire to get the pro-German vote. Hundreds of resolutions calling upon him to resign and upon the Senate to expel him have been passed, and undoubtedly the efforts will be made. At the present time a speech he made at St. Paul a few days ago is being investigated by a Senate committee, and though the enquiry is limited to the truthfulness of remarks he made in that speech it is likely to be the first step in the fight to fire LaFollette. If the committee finds that he lied or that his published remarks were dishonest, it will so report. Then will follow the motion for his dismissal.

NOT Without Friends.

He will not go without a fight, and he has friends in the Senate, probably half a dozen, who think as he thinks and who would vote for him in any circumstances. It is noteworthy, however, that after his speech in defence of his conduct which closed the session on Saturday last, only one fellow Senator shook hands with him. This was the unspeakable Vandaman of Mississippi, a member of that famous "little group of wilful men" denounced by President Wilson. To expel a Senator it is necessary that there should be a two-thirds vote in favor of the action, which makes it impossible that a Senator should ever be expelled by a mere party majority. Half a dozen times in the history of that body the two-thirds vote has fallen against a member, although, looking over the list of expelled members, it is not easy to find a case that exactly corresponds with that of the members from Wisconsin.

Two Recent Examples.

Only a few years ago two members were expelled, although this is not the word that was used. Senator Burton of Kansas was proved to have ap-

appeared before departments of the Government in the interests of outside clients and thus to have forfeited his rights to remain in the Senate. Burton was permitted to resign. The case of Senator Lorimer created a profound political sensation in the United States a few years ago. Its ramifications reached Toronto, for one of the witnesses was interviewed in a local hotel and a dictagraph recorded his testimony, a fact of which he was ignorant at the time. Lorimer was accused of having bribed the members of the State Legislature to elect him as Senator, and the charge was held to have been proved. In his case, although he had held his seat in the Senate for some time, the verdict was that he was not properly elected, and so, without being actually expelled, he was merely fired out.

Southern Senators Quit.

At the time of the Civil War, when the seceding states as well as the

other states were represented in the Senate and the House of Representatives, there were many members naturally whose hearts were with the Southern cause. On the outbreak of war most of these Southerners took up arms for the Confederacy if they were physically fit, and others openly busied themselves in the cause. Some remained behind, and some others who did not represent Southern constituencies did what they could to help the Southern cause. A Southern Senator who remained in Washington was Senator Truman Polk of Missouri. His downfall was due to a letter he wrote to the editor of a Missouri paper in which he enclosed a cheque and used these words, "Will Missouri hesitate a moment to go with her Southern sisters? I hope not." This was written before the war had actually begun, but the Senate held that Polk was a traitor and expelled him.

The Case of Bright.

A friend who had fought for Polk was next accused. This was Senator Powell of Kentucky, who had presided

at a great meeting in his state which denounced Lincoln and demanded the removal of Federal troops from the state. After a bitter fight Powell won out. Senator Stark of Oregon was also investigated, but although he was apparently in sympathy with the South, no overt acts were established against him. The most curious case was that of Senator Bright of Indiana, who, before the war, was shown to have written a letter of introduction for a friend to Jefferson Davis. The friend's business was to sell rifles. Bright sought to justify himself on the ground that he did not expect civil war. He was unable to explain, however, why Davis would want rifles if there was to be no war, and after a long fight he was expelled.

DEVICE TEACHES AIMING WITHOUT USE OF SHOT

A new device with which instruction in aiming a rifle can be given, without use of ammunition, has recently been tried out in teaching recruits the use of firearms. According to the December Popular Mechanics Magazine, in which the device is illustrated, it consists essentially of a wooden rod, 10 in. long, with a metal end which is slipped on and fastened to the muzzle of the rifle. The outer end carries an arrangement in which miniature celluloid targets are placed. There are also screws for moving the target up or down and to the right or left. On this end, too, is a small dotting apparatus and a place for cards to be dotted by it. In learning to aim, the pupil rests his rifle on the instructor's shoulder and directs the latter to move the target, as he, the pupil, deems to accord with "proper aim." When the man aiming believes that the sights and bull's-eye are in proper alignment he calls out "mark," and the instructor, by means of a finger key, actuates the detector. The latter makes a mark on the card which serves as a record of the aim.
