IMPROVEMENTS INSTALLED—A new refrigerator has been recently installed at the Queen Hotel for the purpose of keeping meat and such perishables at a constant temperature, slightly above the freezing point. The refrigerating machine is so devised that when the temperature rises above a certain point the mechanism automatically begins to operate, and stops only when the temperature drops to the required standard. The refrigerating machine works on much the same principle as does the mechanism of the artificial ice plant. There has been installed at the hotel recently an ice making machinery which freezes the water into small cubes.

WOULD (Continued from page 1) have been made to spread revolutionary doctrine and arouse in the minds of the people dissatisfaction with existing systems.

GOOD SENSE PREVAILS "The good hard sense of the North American people and particularly of Canada has, however, prevailed, and I feel sure there is no danger of the efforts of representatives or disciples of Communist organizations or doctrines making any substantial headway in this country. The Canadian people know that whatever the complexion of the Federal Government may be, no belief in or sympathy for these doctrines will be found in Government circles.

"So large a proportion of the Canadian people have a direct monetary interest as property and security owners, representing the savings of their own toil, that they will not be easily swayed or controlled by Communist doctrines. It is most important, however, that the closest co-operation and sympathy should exist between what Communists describe as the 'capitalistic interest' and the workmen who are primarily dependent upon employment opportunities whereby they may maintain themselves and their dependents in keeping with Canadian standards of living. There should be a constant, earnest effort on the part of both of these indispensable partners in our national industrial life to maintain existing standards of working conditions and wages, because the prosperity of the country necessarily largely depends upon the purchasing power of its common people.

"Periods of serious unemployment naturally encourage hope and requests for shorter working days and for shorter working weeks, with increased wage rates to maintain existing standards of earnings, overlooking, perhaps, that the employers are similarly pressed with their own problems and that any concerted effort on the part of either interest is very apt to provoke difficulties and disputes, which these interests, opposed to the present social economic and religious standards, existing in Canada, would welcome so warmly.

"May we not with confidence at this time appeal to all Canadians, Ben Acorn, Milton Stewart and Rev. W. L. Outhouse sang that beautiful hymn 'Going Down the Valley' in a most pleasant way.
