The Hunters' Corner (Continued From Page 7) shot, during the open season five were killed illegally during the winter. The same applies to our Ruffed Grouse (Native partridge) only the ratio is smaller. For every one shot in the open season (Oct. 15th to 31st), three are alleged killed in the close season. In distributing the latest shipment of pheasants, some new territory was taken in. Sizable plantings were made in the vast expanse of eastern Kings county where, it is hoped, nothing short of a search warrant will find them. We hope that they will stick to the swamps and keep away from civilization. I have my doubts about that. The Cock pheasant is very vain and no different from other two legged males. When he sees a flock of well rounded female, Rhode Island Reds in particular, he can't resist the temptation to "show his wares" and thereby sticks his neck out farther than is safe to do so. "Jimmie" Skunk will be having a field day soon in celebration of having the price on his head removed for 8 months out of the 12. This scribe wasn't surprised that some action would be taken by the Department of Agriculture as there wasn't the appreciation shown over the efforts of the Provincial Government to have the skunk nuisance removed or at least reduced to a minimum. Those who should have been interested were more concerned in trying to put something over. The bounty officer had to be on guard every minute against falsification by some form or other.

It was also a common practice to keep a mother drunk under observation until she had her litter of on the lot. A farmer pinned one kitten and then collect bounty up for a week and by that time a family of 10 had arrived. He then collected the dollar bounty per pound or eleven instead of one. The Department concerned got tired of paying out five or six thousand dollars every year without any tangible result. Now anyone affected by the skunk's depredations during eight months of the year either has to kill the animals for nothing or put up with the suit-

able. During the hot months, particularly July and August, some potent poisons were received at the point office. The first sizable flocks of wild geese arrived on St. Patrick's Day, March 17th. He made reference particularly to the importance of a conference on the fisheries industry which takes place in Charlottetown April 1, 2 and 3. He was followed by Mr. Heath Strong, Fourth Prince, who moved the adjournment of the debate to a date convenient for the House. It had been explained by Premier Jones that it was desired
